FLYING GOBS NO MATCH FOR BOYS IN BLUE

Lads from The Lexington Lose Altitude When They Clash with Torrance

With Carl Heinz on the mound for Torrance and his mates pouncing all over the lot to give him full-edged support, the Boys in Blue took the measure of the sall-ers from the U. S. S. Lexington Sunday by a score of 12 to 5. The game was played on the high school grounds before a small crowd of the old faithful fans who were well rewarded for their attendance.

Heinz had the gobs safely cradled in the palm of his mitt, and for the first four frames held them ransom. Only two men reached first in these four innings, Hopkins, the gob pitcher, who singled, and Hamlin, who was safe at first on a fielder's choice as Hopkins was thrown out at second, retiring the side. Only four safe hits were made off Heinz, who was pitching like an old master until the close of the seventh, when with the game safely in hand he gave way to Palace. The gobs fell on the rookie like a long lost brother and proceeded to clout four of their nine hits in the eighth and shove over three more runs. However, Palace hit his stride in the ninth and let the gobs down with one hit and no runs.

Torrance had no trouble in solving the delivery of Hopkins. Only ground rules prevented the boys from socking three homers in a row in the first. As it was, the hits went for doubles, and combined with French's steal, a timely sacrifice by Goldman, a wild pitch that hit Whitman, and put him on first, and some errors by the gobs, netted Torrance three runs. Four more runs came in the fifth, Hopkins was hit hard, and hits and runs were the order of business in the last four innings. Final count, Torrance 12, Sallors, 5.

Weight Increasing Recipes

Gone are the days when it was shameful to weigh much over a hundred pounds. Curves are back, and with them come the privilege of eating the tasty dishes we were forced to abolish several years ago when skeletonization became a fad. Here are three recipes that one may try out now, without fear because their deliciousness will induce one to ask for a second helping—which in the formless days just past, was almost a mortal sin:

ORANGE CUSTARD SOUFFLE
(1 large serving)
2 teaspoons butter
1 tablespoon flour
3/4 cup milk
2 tablespoons orange juice
1 egg
1 tablespoon sugar
Melt butter, add flour and blend until smooth without browning. Pour in the milk and orange juice and cook 3 minutes after the boiling point is reached. Separate yolk from white of egg and beat each. Four hot mixture over yolk, add sugar and gently fold in egg white. Turn into two greased cups and bake in a slow oven, 300 to 325 degrees F., until firm—about 15 minutes.

ORANGE DATE SALAD
1 cup dates
2 oranges
Lettuce
French dressing
Separate dates, cover with boiling water and cook 3 minutes. Drain, dry in the oven, cool, remove pits and cut in halves lengthwise. Halve oranges and remove sections of pulp. Arrange lettuce in salad plates, pile orange sections in center and surround with dates. Serve with French dressing.

SPONGE CAKE
3 egg yolks
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 tablespoon lemon juice
1/4 teaspoon grated lemon rind
2 egg whites
1/2 cup flour
Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored and add sugar gradually, beating constantly. Add lemon juice, rind and stiffly beaten egg whites, folding mixture to keep it airy. Cut and fold in flour and salt. Put in small deep cake pan and bake 40 minutes in a moderate oven, 350 degrees F.
