NORMANDIE TO BE PAVED TO 182ND STREET

Work Starts on Figueroa Blvd. Paving to 190th St. Will Fill Great Need

Appraisers are now at work on Normandie avenue fixing valuation of property to be condemned for the widening and paving of that street.

The present plan is for the paving and widening of Normandie to 100 feet from 120th street to 182nd street. The work on Normandie north of 120th street is already well under way.

It will take about three months for the appraisers to finish their work. It is also learned that unless unforeseen obstacles are placed in the way of completing the work that the people will be riding on concrete pavement on Normandie in about 14 months. The street will be 100 feet wide and 70 feet from curb to curb.

The County Board of Supervisors have also passed a resolution for an appropriation toward the cost of improving Normandie avenue from 182nd street to 235th street, according to a report of the board last week.

Figueras Work was started this week on the grading of Figueras street south of Riverside-Redondo boulevard to 190th street, preparatory to the paving and improving of that street according to information given to Frank Rehor by supervisors of the city of Los Angeles who are now working on the project.

Contract for the improvement of Figueras street was awarded recently to George H. Oswald for \$170,434.80.

Miss Mystery To Give Dance at Earl's Aug. 17


