THAT CAR OF YOURS

The battery in your car is the center of its "nervous system." It should be given the best of care and protected against water, dust and oil.

When the gears slip into neutral on a hill or hard pull, it is usually the result of wear. After the gears become worn they will slip out of mesh easily.

Many motor troubles may be traced to cylinder wear. Re-grinding of cylinders has a desirable effect on the power of your car in that it restores the engine to normal condition.

Thousands of car owners go on thinking they can tell by sight when a tire's pressure is up to the proper standard. Try checking your judgment against a tire gauge some day. You will find that in nine cases out of ten, you are wrong.

As the wheels of a motor car are under strain at sharp turning corners and similar driving emergencies, it is well to have checked over periodically the condition of the wheels and be sure the loose flange nuts are tightened.

A good schedule for keeping a car in first class mechanical condition and operating it economically is as follows: Twice a year have carbon removed, valves ground, and engine tuned up. Every three months, have brakes inspected, and adjusted if necessary. Twice a year take car to electrical service station and have ignition, starting, and lighting systems inspected, and minor work done. Check lubrication according to the chart.

Drill holes smaller than the screw when installing screws in wood on your car. This prevents splitting the wood, or twisting the head off the screw.

Sometimes the shifting lever when in the "high" position is too close to the driver. It is an easy matter to have your mechanic bend this lever to suit your riding position.
