 "Christ Jesus" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon Sunday, September 1, in all branches of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass. The Lesson-Sermon contained Scriptural selections from the Old and New Testaments and correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy.

One of the Scriptural citations gave accounts of healing by Christ Jesus as related in the gospel of Matthew, and was in part as follows: "And when Jesus departed thence, two blind men followed him, crying, and saying, Thou son of David, have mercy on us. And when he was come into the house, the blind men came to him: and Jesus saith unto them, Believe ye that I am able to do this? They said unto him, Yea, Lord. Then touched he their eyes, saying, According to your faith be it unto you. And their eyes were opened."

Correlative passages from Science and Health presented these words of Mrs. Eddy: "Jesus established in the Christian era the precedent for all Christianity, the glory and healing. . . . Our Master said to every follower: 'Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature! . . . Heal the sick! Love thy neighbor as thyself!'"
