

ORGANIZATION OF RETAILERS FORMED HERE

You'll be well repaid for a trip to the business district of Torrance tonight. Nearly every merchant has prepared special window displays of new Autumn goods and the downtown streets will be ablaze with color and light.

Lay Plans for Big Trading Center in Torrance—Problems Discussed Frankly—Next Meeting Oct. 1

Plans for a greater retail center in Torrance were laid at an organization banquet Friday evening, attended by a large majority of Torrance retail merchants.

Sewer Ordered for South Side Redondo Blvd.

A new sewer line was authorized by the City Council last evening for the south side of Redondo boulevard between Madrid and Travena avenues.

The banquet room at Earl's Cafe was crowded to capacity as the most enthusiastic gathering of local merchants that has ever met in Torrance discussed vital problems affecting their businesses and the future development of Torrance as a trading center.

The meeting was called to order by Harry H. Dolley and later turned over to R. F. Hogue, who was elected chairman.

It was decided to keep store window lights burning until 10:30 p. m. each night to encourage more people to window shop.

Directors of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce directed a communication to the Pacific Electric Railway, requesting more modern office equipment and additional help to facilitate shipments of freight to and from Torrance.

A fall opening window display was voted which will be staged tonight, from 7 to 10:30 p. m. Merchants have prepared very attractive displays of Autumn merchandise for the Fall Opening Event tonight and the rest of the week.

Membership in the new Retail Division is limited to merchants who buy goods at wholesale and sell them at retail. A membership drive will be conducted soon to enlist those who were not at the meeting. There are no dues. Meetings will be held the first and third Tuesdays of each month at 8:15 p. m. when a dinner will be served. The next meeting will be held on Tuesday, October 1, and every retail merchant in Torrance is invited to attend, according to R. F. Hogue, chairman.

State Affairs

The Governor Young's Week

Returned a fortnight ago from Southern California where he maintained his summer capitol for two months, Governor Young last week at Sacramento had many a State government problem to solve, many a duty to perform.

Concluded the Governor: "I predict that the diamond jubilee fair... will be the most successful of all our fairs and that it will prove one of the greatest ever held in America."

Appellate Judges. After a hot holiday (Labor Day) spent at the State Mansion, the Governor returned to his desk in the State Capitol.

Early in the day Governor Young called in newsmen, announced to them that he had appointed Superior Judge R. Bernard, of Fresno County, to the bench of the newly-created Fourth District Court of Appeals.

Selection of the two other justices for the Fourth District Court had been made, Governor Young told newsmen, but he could make no announcement of their identity since he had not received word of their acceptance.

By Friday of last week, to the des. of the Governor had come the acceptances of the two other justices. Again Governor Young called in newsmen, announced that he had appointed as Presiding Justice, for the Superior Court, Justice W. A. Sloane, of San Diego, as the third Appellate Judge, Superior Judge Emerson J. Marks of Santa Ana.

Scovel, Santa Ana attorney, to succeed Judge Marks. Considerable care had been exercised, said the Governor, in selecting justices for the new court.

Justice Sloane is widely known as one of the ablest and most experienced judges in California. Aside from nearly ten years' service as Superior judge in San Diego County, he also has served as appellate justice of the second district and associate justice of the State Supreme Court, holding the latter office from 1920 to 1923.

Judge Charles R. Bernard of Fresno has practiced law in Fresno for eighteen years, is the past president of the Fresno County Bar Association and former president of the Fresno City Board of Education.

The Governor said that selection of the third man presented real difficulties, since three counties of the district each put forward for consideration one of their ablest men. He said he finally decided upon Judge Marks.

King's Resignation. Lyman M. King is publisher of the Redlands Daily Facts. Also is he Chief of the Division of Service and Supply under the State Department of Finance.

Although his resignation had helped in the hands of the Governor for only a short time. King not long was outside the administration's family circle.

King, who formerly was a State Senator and candidate for Lieutenant-Governor, in 1926, was appointed to the Finance Department shortly after Governor Young took office in 1927.

Largest Surplus. Fortnight ago Governor Young appointed five State officials as delegates to the convention, this week, of the National Tax Association convention, at Saratoga, N. Y. (See News Review, Sept. 2-8.)

Pointing to the new bank and corporation tax law and the reduction of inheritance taxes, the Governor said they were worth while achievements of tremendous importance, that a low tax on intangible property had placed California in "an enviable position."

Said the Governor: "By careful economies, we were able to meet our tax changes this year with the largest surplus in history. We have accomplished a simple, practical bank and corporation tax, producing less revenue than before, but meeting the forecasts of the Tax Commission."
