Work on Major Blvd. to Go Thru Torrance Is Started

Progress on one of the major state highways to go through Torrance was made last week when the boring of Sepulveda Canyon tunnel through the Santa Monica Mountains was started with dedication ceremonies under the auspices of the Sepulveda Boulevard Association. The new boulevard will extend from San Fernando to San Pedro, providing a quick route to the Ventura Boulevard-Studio City-Valley area to the new University of California educational center and to Torrance, beach cities and the harbor.

cars to make the trip without delay in city traffic. The 600-foot tunnel under Mulholland Highway at the crest of the mountains, will permit a maximum grade of 4 1/2 per cent, and eliminate of all but three curves of less than a 300-foot radius. Sepulveda boulevard leaves San Fernando road near the city of San Fernando, crosses Ventura boulevard, and connects with Arizona avenue in Inglewood, over the Camino Real through Torrance and the state highway leading to San Diego. The boulevard will permit four lanes of traffic, and the tunnel will be forty-two feet wide, with a four and one-half-foot wall in the center to divide traffic.
