RULES FOR EDISON QUESTIONNAIRE CONTEST

Territory: Any boy or girl living in Torrance, or within three miles of Torrance may take part in the contest. Age limit: All boys and girls of fifteen and under are eligible. Closing: The contest will close Friday, October 11. Questionnaires must be left at the Herald office before 5 p. m. on Friday, October 11. Medals: Each boy or girl answering the questionnaire will be given an Edison medal by the Torrance Herald at the time answers to the questionnaire are turned in. Prizes: The winner of the contest in each town will be awarded by the Torrance Herald with a beautiful bronze plaque in a silk-lined case. This plaque is on exhibit in the Chamber of Commerce window. Information: In honor of Light's Golden Jubilee, the Southern California Edison Company has published a special number of its house organ, Busy Buttons, bulletin which contains much material about Mr. Edison's life and achievements. 
