**Gridiron Prospects**

A general opening of Southern California universities and colleges has caused many a football enthusiast to mentally contemplate the coming season. Already has golf, baseball interest fallen off. Now football, autumn king of American sports, reigns, draws former golf and baseball crowds, brings financial gain.

Pre-season predictions indicate a close, exciting, eventful race in the Southern California Conference. By authority of many a football expert three teams are especially favored to win, namely Whittier, San Diego and Occidental.

The teams of the Southern Conference in the order they finished last year and their prospects: Occidental (Tigers) Last year Occidental won the Southern Conference championship, lost only one game to Caltech (13-6). From that banner-winning outfit Oxy's has a eight letter-men returning; a center, a guard, two tackles, two ends and two half-backs. Most serious of Oxy's difficulties is the fact that its team, while it must play only four conference games, those four are on consecutive Saturdays, and all must be won to retain the championship. In their four game schedule are included the teams of San Diego, Whittier, Caltech and Pomona.

Caltech (Engineers) At this Pasadena technical school, only a small remnant of six men returned from last year's excellent eleven. Caltech's Coach Fox Stanton will have his usual difficult row to hoe for it is seldom that he has a full list of veterans to begin the season with. Last year Caltech lost only one game, to Pomona (7-6). Stanton's team has an extremely tough schedule, being booked for six conference games and three more with U. C. L. A., Stanford and Arizon.

Pomona (Sagehens) This Claremont college last year had a good team, lost only one conference game. This year only seven of that team came back; among them, Foke Hartman, star backfield man, and Frank Dyer, end. Thus many a scribe and critic has relegated Pomona to a low place in the conference this year. On the other hand, Pomona has a habit of winning its games, often against great odds. Coach Eugene Nixon is expected, at Pomona, to come through with a good team this year, even though, from outside, prospects look dull.

Whittier (Poets) The gods favored the institution, so it is expected, lettermen back to play more football this year. And new material coming up from the freshmen squad as well as last year's intelligibles, has also increased Whittier hope for a championship team. Coach Newman, comparatively new to the conference, still has many a trick not known to other coaches and is expected to display some canny tactics, new formations.

San Diego (Arctics) Also favored by the fate which has control of lettermen in San Diego State College. No less than fifteen lettermen seeking learning and football came back to school for another term. While the moon waxed full, the sun shone, the heat waves rolled in from the desert, forest fires raged and September's heavy rain poured forth a welcome shower, England's one-time Chancellor of the Exchequer Winston Churchill saw Southern California for the first time last week.

Much talk on many subjects made Author Churchill to interviewers. (See News Review, Sept. 16-22.) Last week Los Angeles, Hollywood, Southern California, were honored by Painter Churchill.

Soldier Churchill lunched Wednesday at Calver City's Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studios with cinematographers, cinematists, cinemexactors, cinemadirectors, cinemawriters, political figures, educators, commerce barons, industrial nobles, artists, literati. Informal was the event; attended only by about 200 people, known the world over.

Among the 500 men employed by Roberti Brothers, fifty belonged to a union. Last week these fifty walked out in a strike. The upholsterers' union, Local No. 15 had stepped in, had said that Roberti Brothers should employ only union workers. On the refusal of the furniture organization to comply with union wishes the union had called out its men. Ascertained cause: Labor saving machinery had been introduced which did not require the services of skilled workmen. Nonplussed, Roberti Brothers employed fifty new men from the ranks of the city's former Edison Company, as an experiment, reduced its rates on the

**Industry**

Careless householders in the habit of going out, leaving their electric lights burning, will find ordinarily large bills smaller in November. At least they will if they are users of the Southern-California Edison's utilities.

Last week from San Francisco came an announcement from the Railroad Commission reducing utility rates, effecting a saving of approximately \$1,400,000 a year to 427,000 consumers of the Southern California Edison Company. Not the first reduction in this present year. In 1927, the Southern California Edison Company, as an experiment, reduced its rates on the

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speculation of increased consumption, found the experiment a success. This new reduction is expected to spur consumers on to further consumption.

Because the announcement came through the Railroad Commission, many an individual thought Southern California Edison had been forced to bring down its prices. Better informed people knew this was not true, knew that the company had asked for the reduction.

With the latest reductions a new schedule of municipal distribution has been formed, giving considerable savings. In the household field, a maximum rate of 5 cents per kilowatt hour, against a present rate of 5.6 cents will be charged in Alhambra, Compton, Inglewood, Long Beach, Monterey, Montebello, Pasadena, Redondo Beach, the San Fernando Valley, Santa Monica and Vernon.

In the following places the maximum rate will be 5.3 against 5.6: Covina, Fullerton, Huntington Beach, Ojai, Ontario, Oxnard, Pomona, Redlands, San Bernardino, Santa Ana, Santa Paula, Ventura and Whittier.

In Big Creek, Delano, Hanford, Lancaster, Lindsay, Porterville, Tulare and Visalia the maximum rate will be 5.6 cents against 6 cents.

**Nitrogen Fixation**

Relatively scarce among the elements which man needs is nitrogen. This colorless, odorless, gaseous substance is found only in the mineral kingdom, in the tissues of plants and animals, and in the air (forms four-fifths of the atmosphere). Essential to the growth of plants is nitrogenous soil. For although nitrogen forms a large part of the atmosphere, plants cannot use it unless it is in the soil, coming into the plants via the roots. Therefore nitrogen is used by all farmers as fertilizer.

Last week, at Long Beach, came the announcement that Shell Oil's subsidiary, Shell Development Company, had virtually closed negotiations which would result in the building of a nitrogen fixation plant near there. Up until the present, the 400 acres of property desired by the Shell organization for its plant has been owned by the Montana Land Company. To the Montana company's agents, the Jones Investment Company, the Shell company has pledged the expenditure of \$25,000 within the first six months of occupancy, in erecting the plant. If the deal is consummated, the plant will be the largest of its kind in the West; perhaps in the United States.

Not long has it been humanly possible to extract large quantities of nitrogen from the air. The Shell company will operate under lately obtained German patents, electricity being used to power the plant.
