

**Speech of Rotary Governor Inspired 300 at Banquet**

Over 300 Rotarians and their wives were inspired by a brilliant address given by District Governor Harvey D. Lyon, at a joint banquet of the Torrance, San Pedro, and Wilmington Rotary Clubs at the Wilmington Yacht Clubhouse Monday evening.  
The occasion was the annual inspection trip of the District Governor and was a highlight in Rotary activities of the year. Earlier in the day Governor Lyon met with the individual clubs in their respective cities, and Mrs. J. S. Lancaster honored Mrs. Lyon with a bridge luncheon at her home on Post avenue. Thirty-six ladies, the wives of Torrance Rotarians, attended the beautifully appointed luncheon.  
The speech of Governor Harvey Lyon at the evening banquet is given below with the thought that the public will enjoy learning more of Rotary ideals and aims.  
"Ex-Governor Lowden of the

State of Illinois, addressing the Pacific Slope Daily Show Banquet in Oakland recently, said that "the time has come when business men are no longer satisfied with a mere money profit, but their desire for happiness can be satisfied only by the rendering of service to their fellow-man."  
"As the Governor was speaking, I could not help thinking of the part that Rotary and other Service Clubs have played in creating the public opinion which has caused the hearty applause that greeted the Governor's statement."  
"A short time ago I had the pleasure of entertaining in my home Service Club Man Number One in the world, Paul Harris, the founder of Rotary. Paul said that he little thought, as he gathered three friends around him at a luncheon table in Chicago in 1905, that he was then planting the seed that in twenty odd short years was to grow until it should encircle the entire globe, and become the greatest single factor outside the Christian Church (when you take into account all the Service Clubs) in elevating the standards of the business and professional world. And yet such is the fact."  
Public and Rotary  
"If you were to stop ten men on the street and ask them what they thought was the prime object of a Rotary Club, probably nine of them would say that it is to help the Boy Scouts or Camp Fire Girls, to give vocational guidance or financial assistance to high school students, to help crippled children, or to put over some other more or less spectacular achievement in the community. And right here I do not want to be misunderstood, for I do believe in all these very worthy activities. And yet they are not the prime object of a Rotary Club. The prime object of a Rotary Club is a development of the individual member to his fullest capacity for service, so that when he is called upon by the community he will be ready and anxious to respond. These very worthy activities just mentioned are a means for developing the individual member; rubbing shoulder to shoulder in a worthy undertaking is one of the best ways for encouraging fellowship and individual growth. And yet these activities are the by-products rather than the main object of a Rotary Club.  
"In an article of sympathy with Rotary ideals, Harry Emerson Fosdick speaks of what he calls our "representative capacity." He points out that we can each stand for something not ourselves—for an ideal, an ideal, or a cause. We can so identify ourselves with our ideals that no one can think of us without thinking of the things for which we stand. This is one of the most wonderful things about personality. A new-born babe may be only an "Caryle" said, "a red and pulpy infant," and yet it is not long before the child begins to gather about itself associations and characteristics so distinct that whenever we think of the child we think of them.  
"And with maturing years this "representative capacity" is only increased. Words almost synonymous to us are Galileo and astronomy, Napoleon and militarism, Captain Kidd and piracy, Beau Brummell and vanity, Michelangelo and art, or Lincoln and liberty. Think of the men and women you know, and see how invariably they have acquired personal suggestiveness, until when you think of them you really think of the things for which they stand. Rotary believes that in the use we make of this "representative capacity" lies one of the real responsibilities of life.  
"Our Country is especially fortunate in the men whose birthdays we celebrate in the month of February. They might have been men of another type. The crises of our national history might have thrust to the top personalities possessing superior powers of leadership which the country surely needed, but looking the qualities of character of Washington and Lincoln. We might have had the tomb," says Fosdick, "of some cynical militarist as the central symbol of the Nation's glory. As it is, our history is drawn like an ellipse around the faces of two

whither they were going, and the youths answered with one voice, "To the City of Happiness!" The aged pilgrim gazed at them gravely. "I have sought," he replied feebly, "over the most part of the world for the city of which you speak. Three such pairs as you see on my feet have I worn out upon this pilgrimage. And all this while I have not found the roadway, and as I lay there, I seemed to hear an angel saying, 'Behold, the City of Happiness lies at every man's threshold; there be no need to journey far in its search! So now after all these years I am going back to my little mountain home, and here, God willing, I shall find the Happy City!'"  
Boy Movement  
"Theodore Roosevelt said, 'If you do anything for the average man, you must do it before he becomes a man,' and another able writer has said, 'Democracy has not been a success—not yet; has not been a failure—not yet. Democracy tomorrow, when we have world democracy, will be a success just as certain as the boys of America today are taught the principles of democracy and the duties and responsibilities.'  
"The boys of our country, and of Torrance in particular, are now a challenge to us. In this Boy Scout movement the boy is offered us at this period in his life which authorities say is the most crucial in determining his future. It is the great decision time, the time for setting up ideals and establishing life standards. It is our opportunity to help build into the boy those ideals of love and service that make for happy homes and good government. In this Boy Scout period, the boy ceases to think of himself alone, and thinks instead in terms of the gang. He learns invaluable lessons in co-operation and team work; and, rightly directed, the gang, (or Scout troop) gives the boy his first practical lesson in true democratic government. If another of Theodore Roosevelt's statements is true, (that the measure of any man's life is the number of lives in which he lives, then surely boy's work is a wonderful way for each of us to live our lives to the fullest.  
Friendship  
"Emerson says, 'Every man passes life in search after friendship; and despair; these are the long, long years that bow the

help in this search. First, by the very basis of its formation, built upon a diversity of interests, without competition among its members. Friendship is of certain highly desirable and amount is possible among competitors. But when you get a lawyer, a business man, a capitalist, an artist, a doctor, a farmer, all together, each one trying to present his viewpoint and harmonize them all, then the practical learns from the visionary, and vice versa; and a friendship is encouraged and developed that cannot be brought about in any other way.  
"Rotary has learned to capitalize the fact that man is like a thermometer. The spirit in him rises in the warm glow of friendship, or falls in the chill atmosphere of indifference. Or, if you would change the figure of speech, most of you know there are certain plants that will not grow in a sour soil. It was long ago discovered that the application of lime would correct the acidity in the soil. One writer, describing the action of the lime, says, 'The lime makes the soil sweet—makes it friendly.' Now that is just what Rotary does to human relationships—it sweetens them and makes them friendly.  
"And in this process it does what to my mind is one of the most wonderful accomplishments; it brings back into the lives of busy men the spirit of play.  
Play Like Boys  
"Many men are finding in this play-part of Rotary that which they have 'loved long since and lost a while,' the joy of their boyhood; and many other men, because of an unfortunate start in life, are finding these joys for the first time. Rotary, (to quote from an unknown author) is teaching men that 'youth' is not a time of life; it is a state of mind. It is not a matter of ripe cheeks, red lips, and supple knees; it is a temper of the will, a quality of the imagination. Youth means a predominance of courage over timidity, of the appetite for adventure over the love of ease. This often exists in a man of fifty more than in a boy of twenty. Nobody grows old by merely living a number of years. People grow old by deserting their ideals. The passing of the years may wrinkle the skin; but to give up one's enthusiasm wrinkles the soul. Worry, doubt, self-distrust, fear, and despair; these are the long, long years that bow the

heart and turn the spirit back to dust. You are as young as your faith, as old as your doubt; as young as your self-confidence, as old as your fear; as young as your hope, as old as your despair. In the central place of your heart is an evergreen tree; its name is Love. So long as it flourishes you are young. When it dies, you are old. In the central place of your heart is a radio station. So long as it continues to receive messages of beauty, hope, cheer, courage, and power from God and from your fellow-men, so long are you young. Rotary has its great hold on men because it is continually sending messages of beauty, hope, cheer, courage, and power into every life that it touches.  
"I cannot but think that Oliver Wendell Holmes, away back in 1859, had a vision of a Rotary meeting when he wrote:  
"Has there any old fellow got mixed with the boys?  
If there has, take him out without making a noise.  
Hang the almanac's cheat and the catalogue's spite.  
Old time is a liar, we're twenty tonight.  
We've a trick, we young fellows, you may have been told,  
Of talking in public, as if we were old.  
That boy we call Doctor, and this we call Judge,  
It's a neat little fiction; of course it's all fudge.  
You see that old boy laughing? You think he's all fun.  
But the angels laugh too at the good he has done.  
The children laugh loud as they troop to his call.  
And the poor man that knows him laughs loudest of all.  
Yes, we're boys, always playing with tongue—or with pen.  
And I sometimes have asked, 'Shall we ever be men?  
Shall we always be youthful and laughing and gay  
Till the last dear companion drops smiling away?  
Then here's to our boyhood, its gold and its gray,  
The stars of its winter, the dew of its May.  
And when we have done with our life-lasting toys,  
Dear Father, take care of Thy children, the BOYS.'"
