YE OLDE FAVORITES

No matter how many new recipes one tries, a few of the old timers should never be forgotten. Lemon pie is a dessert that we demand every so often. Here are two recipes, showing novel methods of composing this delicacy. Whether or not you like your own lemon pie, try these:

PATTY CAKE PIE
3 eggs
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1 cup sugar
2 tablespoons flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon melted butter
1 1/2 cups milk

Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon-colored. Add lemon juice and rind. Mix sugar, flour and salt and add to lemon mixture. Stir in melted butter and milk and fold in stiffly-beaten egg whites. Turn into pie tin lined with crust and put into hot oven (350 degrees). After 10 minutes reduce heat to moderate (250 degrees) and continue baking 20 minutes longer, or until filling is firm.

CHIFFON PIE
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups boiling water
Juice of one lemon
Juice and grated rind of 1 orange
2 eggs
Mix sugar, flour and salt; add boiling water, stirring constantly. Cook 15 minutes. Add well-beaten egg yolks, rind and juice of fruit and cook until thick. Cool. Make meringue of the whites of the eggs, 1/2 cup powdered sugar and 1 teaspoon lemon juice. Whip one-fourth of meringue into custard mixture and turn into baked pie shell. Cover with remaining meringue and brown in moderate oven.

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THAT CAR OF YOURS

Do not use cheap oil or grease in your car. Very good grades can be purchased at moderate prices, and they are the cheapest in the long run.

Due to the headlight law that is now in effect, it is advisable to have the lights adjusted for the proper focus, at the same time seeing that the proper lamp bulbs and lens are installed. This will give a good opportunity to have the reflectors cleaned well for better light.

If the motorist depends entirely on the motorometer to keep the proper amount of water in the cooling system, and also for overhauling records, the motorometer should be checked frequently to insure accuracy.

A rear sight mirror is necessary on every car for driving safety, and the rear body glass should always be kept clean for effective use of the mirror. A rear sight mirror should be carefully selected for some of them on the market have a tendency to reduce or magnify the size of objects.

A slipping or grabbing clutch should be adjusted as soon as noticed, for the sooner the adjustment is made the longer the plates and facings will wear. A clutch that grabs hard causes undue strain on all working parts between the clutch and the wheels; in fact, a grabbing clutch has caused chipping or breaking off of pinion or master gear teeth and twisting off of rear axle shafts.

Spark plugs should be checked occasionally to note that they do not collect too much carbon and that the points are adjusted properly. When points

have burned off allowing too great a gap, a new plug should be installed.
