Proving the economy of a municipal or mutual water system, Frank Spoon of 2275 Redondo boulevard submitted a water bill of a friend of his who lives in Willowbrook, and uses all the water he wishes at a flat rate of 40 cents a month.

The friend, L. E. Smith of 2225 Weber street, Willowbrook, is in County Water Works District No. 10. When the water system was first installed, Mr. Smith says the rate was 40 cents a 1000 cubic feet. This was later reduced to 60 cents, and just recently it was found that the district could operate on a flat rate of 40 cents per month without regard to quantity of water used.

Mr. Spoon is an enthusiastic supporter of the movement for a municipal water system in Torrance.


