Lost in Death Valley, But Torrance Men Enjoy Trip

Lost in the dead of night in Death Valley, sleeping over a dead man's grave, and finally being rewarded by the fascinating charm of Death Valley's magic scenery, were among the interesting experiences last week of four Torrance men who made the trip to the land of Death Valley Scotty's domain. The men were Gene DeBra, George Scott, Walter Shumaker, and Dr. G. D. Kryder, late of Chicago and now a resident of Torrance. The story as told by Walter Shumaker, follows:

"We left Torrance for Death Valley via Lancaster, Mojave and Lone Pine, stopping at Mojave for a midnight lunch, then on to Lone Pine at 5 a. m., another stop for coffee, then on via Darwin to Bungalow City in Death Valley where a stop was made for lunch at 11:30 a. m. The afternoon was spent in exploring the valley and stops were made at Stovepipe Wells, Surveyor's Well, and an effort was made to reach Titus canyon. However, darkness came upon us and we were forced to turn around. In retracing our route, the trail was lost and so we were lost in Death Valley.

"However, after much hunting with flashlights on foot, the trail was found and we reached Bungalow City for dinner. After dinner we went to the Sand Dunes and built a fire and lay down under the stars and had a good sleep. "Come the dawn, and we were up bright and early and put out for Beatty, Nevada. Enroute we stopped at Rhyolite, the Ghost City,

a city that flourished in 1901, on account of gold taken from the Bull Frog mine. Now it is a desolate place indeed. We had a stop at the Glass Bottle house and took pictures of it. We next explored an abandoned mine which took us into the bowels of the earth so far we were glad to get back to daylight and sunshine, and a combined breakfast and lunch. Soon we were off again to Death Valley Scotty's place. This is a very fine place on an oasis in the desert mountains, in which has been built a mansion. A few high lights of this palace of the desert are the 336,000 pipe organ, the turbine generated electric plant, the carillon or chime bell tower, and the solar water heating system. A lake is being built and is to have a glass room beneath it where one may sit and watch the gold fish disport themselves.

"We then went over into the valley proper again, this time in the north end, where Scotty has 1000 acres fenced rabbit tight, some buildings, and several green fields where water is available. We then retraced our trail back to the mansion where we attempted to buy some gasoline. We were told that they had nothing to sell, but were given orders that anyone coming in need of fuel should be given enough to take them to Bonne Clair. We took three gallons and thanked them kindly, and went on our way.

"At Bonne Clair, where we had the best dinner of the trip. Then

we pushed on to Death Valley again, 91 miles from Scotty's and to Stovepipe Wells where we slept in a battle dugout. Right under us were the bones of a dead mule who was found in the entrance of the dugout and had died from thirst and over-exposure. They buried him right there, but we slept fine.

"I must mention the lone prospector named Lonesome Buck Waters. We met him and his five burros coming down the trail when we undertook to go to Titus Canyon. He had lost his dog and his burros would not stay on the trail. We learned some choice profane language from him, all of which is needed to drive burros. He camped at Stovepipe Wells and was our companion when we slept in the dugout. In the morning, he gave us some of his coffee and we haven't gotten over it yet. Boy, he makes it strong.


"After coffee, we pushed on to Ryan, where we had breakfast; then back to the south end of the Valley where we took in the Devil's Golf Course, and the Salt Pools. It is 310 feet below sea level here. We also visited the old Borax Works, Furnace Creek Inn, and looked things over in general. Then we started for Torrance, via Ryan, Shoshone, Baker, Victorville, Cajon Pass, etc. A good time was had by all and after a few nights' rest we all wanted to do it all over again."


