## FOOTBALL TROPHY AWARDED NARBONNE FOR THIRD YEAR

### Rousing Cheers Given As Gauchos Receive Full Size Silver Football As Winners In Marine League

The beautiful natural size silver football, emblematic of the Marine League championship, was awarded to Narbonne high school Tuesday at the regular Marine League meeting held at Narbonne. Although George Washington high and the same percentage as Narbonne, the Gauchos decisively defeated the cherry pickers, 16-3 and a long established C. I. F. ruling gave Narbonne the championship.

Men making letters on the championship varsity are Arthur Thistle, Ralph Adams, Wesley Frownfelter

and Robert West, ends; Norman Robb, Arthur Johnson and Marion Randies, tackles; Kazamona Hirstata, Roll Gerhart and Joe Campbell, guards; Chesley Jeter and Charles Stamp, centers; George Robinson, Harry Morrison and Edward Holman, halves; Ralph Ruffard and Roy Dawson, fullbacks, and David Wolverton, quarterback. Six of these men, Morrison, Robinson, Thistle and Stamp will be lost by graduation. If the rest return Narbonne should have a good team again next year despite the fact that most of those graduating are outstanding stars and were chosen on "All-Marine League" teams.

Miss Griffin, as president of the Marine League and principal, presented the handsome football trophy to the team at a student body assembly Wednesday morning. As captains are appointed for each game and the honor captain will be elected until the annual football banquet, the whole team just stepped forward and accepted it amidst rousing cheers of the student body.

GARDENA, Nov. 25.—The recent announcement by Harry I. Gilbert, Los Angeles capitalist, who in the past few months has been very active in the purchase of Gardena Valley properties, to the effect that he has sold several building lots on Daisy street near Vermont avenue to the Weilsitz Finance and Building Company is believed to indicate an increasing interest in the Gardena district as location for homes for industrial workers in Torrance.

M. I. Weilsitz, president of the Weilsitz Finance and Building Company, has for the past ten years been well known in community development work incident to the ever increasing growth of the Los Angeles harbor district. During the past few months, he has purchased acreage in the vicinity of Main street and Carson avenue, where, during 1930, it is planned to erect 100 single family residences.

Gilbert played host to the people of Gardena Valley when he started construction Saturday on the first six houses in the Hayden Tract. 
