## SAME JINX COMES RIDING TOR. BLUES

### Pacific Steamship Crew Takes Third Game of Local Series

After chasing the jinx off their trail on Dec. 1 by shutting out the powerful Pacific Steamship team 3 to 0, Torrance let him hop right back last Sunday when they lost to the Steamship crew by a score of 3 to 1, on Hollis field, San Pedro. This makes it two out of three for the Steamers. No alibis are necessary when these two teams tangle, as they are so evenly matched that it is just a case of which happens to get the breaks.

Big Jim Ault was on the mound for Torrance. Only six hits were gathered off Jim, but unfortunately for the home boys, three of the Steamer crew's blows came in the same inning, with a resulting three runs.

Joe Storti helped to win his own game with the wiffle, for it was his single which started the fireworks in the third. Ruttman had slammed one to the outer gardens and was on third when Storti pushed one through the infield and Ruttman scored. Joe scored on Blenkron's long hit to left field, but the Three-I league's descendant man was thrown out at the plate in a fast relay from Wardman to Ferrit to crowdman to nail Blenkron three feet away. Menges singled and scored on Biggs' long hit to left. Biggs, not so fast as Blenkron, was thrown out at third on another relay from left field via Wolfe to Pearl. This ended the inning for the Steamship side, and for the next six innings they simply held their lead.

Torrance threatened several times during the game but only once were they able to get a man around the circuit. Blenkron robbed them of two scores in the first inning when he made a great running one-handed catch of Pearl's high fly to right. Blenkron put on a burst of speed from short right to overtake the hit which was apparently headed for the fence. Wolfe and Young, waiting for the ball to drop safe, died on base when Blenkron made his horseshoe

catch. The Blues scored in the fourth when Ruttman dropped Hubbel's throw to catch Duczau. Johnny scored on Atwood's triple, but Rook was left stranded while Ault was thrown out at first and Frenchie popped to shortstop.

Torrance had men on base in every inning but one and gathered eight hits and three passes off Storti, but were unable to make their hits register. Goldman replaced Wardman in left in the seventh, but was unlucky enough to hit into the beginning of a double play for the third out in his only time at bat. All the outfielders saw action in the seventh, when Goldman robbed Morris of a hit, Frenchie accepted his only chance of the day in right and Young in center killed Biggs' hopes of a homer.

## Goddard Hatchery At Gardena Known Throughout U. S.

The Goddard Hatchery at 17601 South Normandie avenue, Gardena, boasts that it can hatch anything from a pigeon to a goose egg, and next year it is going to try hatching ostrich eggs.

The Goddard Hatchery is known throughout the United States where it has won many ribbons. At Springfield, Mass., Mr. Goddard was elected the director from the Pacific Coast district of the newly organized American Poultry Association, certified hatcheries professor. Mr. Goddard's Hatchery won the heavy breed class at the 18th National Egg laying contest at Mt. Grove, Missouri, with a pen of Australorps, which breed was first imported to America by Mr. Goddard. The local hatchery was in competition with the best breeders in the world and produced a pen averaging 259 eggs to the hen for the year.

Mr. Goddard is now hatching nearly all breeds and has some fine flocks mated. The Goddard hatchery at Gardena has a Robbin's incubator with a capacity of 25,000 eggs. It is all electric and averages 75 per cent chicks to the eggs, which in poultry circles is considered very good at this time of the year.

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
