Being Different Brings Success

IT'S a long step from being janitor of a small town post office to the presidency of a \$156,000,000 corporation, but C. M. Fuller did it because he is an individualist.

Inspired by a lecture in his youth to be different, he has carried out the thought even in the building of service stations for the company of which he is now president, the Richfield Oil Company of California.

When but twelve years old, he was taken by his father to hear a lecture entitled "Acres of Diamonds," given by Rev. Russell Conway at Bakersfield, California. The thought behind the talk was that if a man was individual, he was unwilling to follow in the footsteps of the throng, he would see that real opportunity lay at his feet if he could but find that endeavor in life for which he was best suited. The boy was so impressed that during the school years that followed, instead of playing during summer vacations as did other children, he worked at as many trades and professions as possible.

At the age of twenty-one, following this procedure of learning so early of banking, banking, farming, meat packing, real estate selling and newspaper work at Bakersfield, all the time holding the position of janitor of the local post office at

that time, Fuller found himself in the oil game. Twenty years have intervened, and at forty-one he heads one of America's major petroleum corporations, the youngest man from a purely age standpoint to have ever risen to the presidency of an oil company of such size.

And it is to his standing in the industry, he has just been re-elected as a director of the American Petroleum Institute.

All through these years his craving and hobby was to build beautiful buildings that would be different from the ordinary structure of steel and brick structure. It has been encased in black and gold, making it the outstanding structure of the Pacific Coast. On top is an aerial beacon that can be seen for miles. The idea of using such a combination came from Fuller, the individualist.

"Be different. Offer a better service to the public. Make them remember you but not with long words or actions. Know as much as possible about the other man's business so that you can talk to him intelligently."

ORDINANCE NO. 198 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 167 AND ORDINANCE NO. 159.

The City Council of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows: SECTION 1

Section 61-J of Ordinance No. 107 as amended by Ordinance No. 139 of the City of Torrance is hereby amended to read as follows: "Section 61-J. All wooden forms must be removed after pouring concrete, including any portions of such forms which may have been buried or placed under ground, before the concrete so poured is used; and all wood and vegetable matter of every kind shall be removed before pouring any concrete floors, and no dirt shall be placed or allowed to remain nearer than (6) six inches from any woodwork of any building; and the foundations of all porches and patios shall come to the lower edge of the floor joist so that there will be at least (6) six inches between the dirt floor and any wood, and any wood.

SECTION 2. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance and cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald and thereupon the same shall be in full force and effect.

CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR TO SPEAK HERE

State Controller Ray L. Riley Plans to Visit Torrance Early in Year

Every city, town and hamlet of Southern California will have its share of "old fashioned" politics during the 1930 gubernatorial campaign. This was determined here today when State Controller Ray L. Riley, candidate for the Republican nomination for governor, made known plans for a tour of the southern section of the state.

The tour contemplates frank discussion with voters, torch light parades and Riley rallies. During his flying jaunt, Riley will be accompanied by his secretary, Clem Whitaker, and leaders in each section of the state he visits.

Riley and his party will be in Torrance soon after the first of the year. Speaking dates for Torrance and other nearby communities are being tabulated in the Los Angeles Riley headquarters at Room 406, Washington building.

The state controller, first gubernatorial candidate, to throw his hat into the ring, plans a campaign built around the issue of whether or not California governmental expenses shall continue to increase.

"During the last 12 months," said Riley, "the overhead of California state government has shot up no less than 70 per cent. The population has not increased accordingly."

"The state, according to Riley, is facing bankruptcy within the next three years unless the present rate of expenditures is halted. The controller is now engaged in preparing a statistical table on expenditures of the state government and estimated income.

"Through this compilation, the controller expects to substantiate in contention that the expenditures soon will exceed the revenue of the state.

"Should we build few state departments or shall we build new homes?" asks Riley.
