It's The Woman Who Buys--Her Man's Ties

United Press Staff Correspondent LOS ANGELES, Jan. 30.—(UP)—If men are accused of lacking taste in dress, in the fit of their hats, the flare of their ties, or the patterns in their shirts and socks, they have a perfect alibi.

Furthermore, it's scientific, for statistics prepared by a Los Angeles merchants' organization will bear it out.

It's the woman who buys and buys and buys. Man, the once proud provider, wears the ties she chooses, the socks, too, and eats the viands she carts from the neighborhood grocery.

Those bright-hued socks—three times out of four; it was a woman who bought them. The new neckwear almost vanished at times, three out of five of them were carried from stores by feminine hands.

For the fact is that women do most of the buying. Percentage figures clinch the awful truth. Out of every 100 purchases in a drug store, 73 of them are made by women. Music in the

home, when it comes from a piano, is brought there 75 times out of 100 by a woman, and only 22 times by a man.

When it comes to food, the figures show how times have changed since the good old days when great granddads came in with meat fresh from the hunt. Of 100 purchases made at grocery stores, 31 are made by women.

A check on men's sock purchases revealed that women did 75 per cent of the buying, and they buy 67 per cent of all men's neckties sold in Los Angeles.

The only things that men still select are hardware and automobiles, and even here woman's influence is apparent in colored gears for the kitchen, and vanities for the car. Still, in this department man's advantage is nothing to write home about. He purchases 55 automobiles out of every 100 as compared with 41 purchased by women.

The recent survey shows there is no competition at all when it comes to buying groceries, silks, department store goods, electric supplies and jewelry; it's the woman who buys. But—the man still pays—or at least a goodly share.
