Device Boon to Lazy Radio Fan

Automatic Set Is Worked by Remote Control from Any Spot Desired

CHICAGO.—(UP)—A boon to the lazy, the sick and the weary, an automatic radio worked by remote control, has been brought forth here. All you need is a small device beside your bed and what-calls-it-on the radio. The device, while it must be built into the receiver, entails only minor changes in the design of most sets. The most important feature is a brushless, reversible motor. This is but three inches in diameter and three quarters of an inch long. Major Herbert H. Frost, president of the Utah Radio Products company, announced by the completion of the device by the company's engineer, E. L. Barrett after six years of work.

Included with this tiny motor are an automatic clutch, gearing, automatic selector switch with adjusting buttons, manual control and control transfer switch. This is attached to the variable condenser and to the other unit of the device, the remote control switch box, by a cable of length necessary to reach to the radio. The remote control switch box is 8 inches long, 3 1/2 wide, and 1 1/2 high. It may be placed, as indicated, where ever desired, from the kitchen sink to the bathroom floor. It is made up of a switch for automatic tuning of nine pre-selected stations, two buttons for tuning in stations other than the pre-selected ones, a knob for remote volume control. FIVE YEARS AGO IN TORRANCE As Told by the Files of This Paper


