**BRIDGE COMMENT**

Readers of mine, now please don't drift into the idea that you can become proficient Contract Bridge players by following my column. Of course, you can become a player of sorts by studying the rules or laws of any game. You should really start under expert supervision if you are to avoid the acquiring of the usual beginners' faults. Take for instance the leads. There are so many exceptions to the 4th from longest and strongest, that it would be confusing to give you a list of the exceptions without due explanation. What one does under instruction is to bring out the exceptions and explain the mechanics of the play. I go on record right now as being forever against any lead or play of any kind that can't be explained mathematically to show that according to averages it will bring the best results. Contract is a game of inferences and deductions—yes, the words are synonymous, but you must learn to play the game to get the full advantage of the two words. There is no satisfaction like that of extra knowledge in bridge.

You oldsters can remember when one had to apologize for playing cards—not so long ago, either, but now even the churches have lifted the embargo. So, one must now apologize if one does not play cards, and it won't be long until it will either be necessary to apologize or stay home if one cannot play contract.

**Introducing Sue**

Sue—our own Sue. Oh, yes, you all know her—what a bridge player. She will admit it if cornered but not otherwise. Yes, she is a good auction bridge player because she will not bid unless she holds well, you know it must be a sure thing. Sue has no confidence in partners so of course she puts over a good show when she is declarer (player of the hand). And by her silence she often misleads her adversaries (as well as her partner) and is able to get over some very nice doubles. No, that is not bridge. It did give certain doubtful results in the old game but Sue is going to be left entirely out of the game of Contract if she doesn't mend her ways. You guessed it—Sue is the wife of Ned. As you recall they are in the North (Ned) and South (Sue) column for the delay caused by a new deal and also because Sue should have kept her hands off the table. Well, Sue would have been very sweet about it—then. But one other trying fault of Sue's that is hard on people with nerves and you might as well become accustomed to it in this: She snaps her cards, keeps flipping them, making cute little noises like a trap drummer. No, she wouldn't care to divert your mind but having decided she has no bid that is her way to show that she thinks you should hurry up and pass. But Sue means well and is trying to mend her ways—perhaps (if not it won't take long for any one of my juvenile class to "show her up").

Grover, old thing, hope that our readers are not impatient for the games. They can get games in most any magazine and over the radio. But I am trying to give them something that they have always needed—something that no one has ever had the audacity or perhaps the foolhardiness to give them. In my introduction of Sue you will notice that I am giving the reader-players a good mirror and food for thought—not to mention a chance for betterment.
