

HOLLYWOOD, March 10—(UP)—Women's feet are getting larger.

Fearsome Reptiles Also Creatures of Mystery

(Editor's note: Herewith is presented the first of four articles that summarize a series of lectures held in connection with snake and reptiles of the desert country of the west, by A. V. Napier, managing editor of the Journal-Miner of Prescott, Ariz. Mr. Napier is an authority on this subject, and in his articles brands as false some of the more popular beliefs held in connection with snake and reptile life, at the same time revealing some unique facts hitherto unknown. An Irishman who was defending his nationality against the ridicule of a story-teller is credited with the remark: "Sure and half the lies they tell against the Irish ain't so."

The proportion of snake stories is far greater than 50 per cent. At least 90 per cent of the current popular information regarding snakes is not substantiated by facts.

In the story, a snake is invariably found "coiled around a tree." As a matter of fact, no snake ever did coil around a tree. If he did coil, he couldn't possibly strike. Take off your belt and coil it up like the spring of a watch. Then straighten one end out as a snake is supposed to. It will straighten when struck. It will be seen that the belt twists itself entirely around at least twice. A snake striking from such a coil would either twist its body around several times or turn its head over and over sideways, which is certainly does not. The thing the snake does before striking is to form its

length into a series of folds, or loops, from which it can spring straight forward without twisting. It may appear to the excited observer to be coiled, but the belt will prove that such observation is in error.

Many people believe they are computing a rattlesnake's age when they count its rattles. The number of rattles has no definite bearing on a snake's age. A new rattle is formed whenever the snake sheds its skin. This may be from twice to six times a year, depending upon the length of the season and the inclination of the snake. Snakes can shed their skins almost at will. Some of the largest and oldest snakes have only a few rattles because they are broken off by contact with rocks.

Any snake will crawl over a horseshoe rope or any other kind of rope. The camper who has made his bed on the ground secure against invasion by reptiles by laying a horseshoe rope around it, may as well save the rope. A chalk mark would do just as well. Is it reasonable that a snake who lives in the brush and continually crawls over stubble and even cactus if necessary would hesitate at a mere rope?

Many believe that prairie dogs and rattlesnakes live in the same holes. A prairie dog may live with a rattlesnake, but not long. Snakes are usually found in prairie dog towns, but they are there because prairie dogs make an appealing meal. A few large gopher snakes will depopulate a prairie dog town much more quickly than a prairie dog or traps. The snake will enter the holes and make a meal of a whole family.

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to be done in closing up, vacating and abandoning in whole the portions of certain streets and alleys in said City of Torrance, as more particularly appears in the Resolution of the City Clerk, to which reference is hereby made for further particulars, and which said Resolution of Intention is in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

RESOLUTION OF INTENTION NO. 446

WHEREAS, it is necessary to the public interest and convenience that those portions of Columbia Avenue, Wilson Avenue, and Warwick Avenue, Crosby Avenue, 206th Street, together with certain alleys, all as hereinafter described, be closed, vacated and abandoned in whole as hereinafter described.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Torrance, State of California, as follows:

Section 1. That the public interest and convenience require, and that it is the intention of the City Council of the City of Torrance, State of California, to order the following work to be done, to-wit:

The closing up, vacating and abandoning in whole of:

COLUMBIA AVENUE between the Northernly line of 206th Street and the Westernly line of Warwick Avenue, and between the Easternly line of Warwick Avenue and the Westernly line of Crosby Avenue, and between the Easternly line of Crosby Avenue and the Westernly line of Western Avenue;

WILSON AVENUE between the Easternly line of Warwick Avenue and the Westernly line of Crosby Avenue, and between the Easternly line of Crosby Avenue and the Westernly line of Western Avenue;

WARWICK AVENUE between the Northernly line of 206th Street and the most Northernly line of Tract 10073, as per map recorded in Book 113, Pages 16 and 17 of Maps, records of Los Angeles County;

CROSBY AVENUE between the Northernly line of 206th Street and the most Northernly line of Tract 10073, as per map recorded in Book 113, Pages 16 and 17 of Maps, records of Los Angeles County;

NORTHERLY ONE-HALF (1/2) OF 206TH STREET between the Westernly line of Tract 10073, as per map recorded in Book 113, Pages 16 and 17 of Maps, records of Los Angeles County, and the Westernly line of Western Avenue;

FIRST ALLEY North of 206th Street between the Easternly line of Warwick Avenue and the Westernly line of Crosby Avenue, and between the Easternly line of Crosby Avenue and the Westernly line of the first alley West of Western Avenue, as shown on a map of Tract 10073, recorded in Book 113, Pages 16 and 17 of Maps, records of Los Angeles County;

FIRST ALLEY West of Western Avenue between the Northernly line of 206th Street and the Southernly line of Wilson Avenue, and between the Northernly line of Columbia Avenue and the Southernly line of the Northernly line of Crosby Avenue, and between the Easternly line of Crosby Avenue and the Westernly line of Western Avenue, as shown on a map of Tract 10073, recorded in Book 113, Pages 16 and 17 of Maps, records of Los Angeles County;

Section 2. That the district of lands to be affected by said work is bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the Northeast corner of Tract 10073 as shown on map recorded in Book 113, Pages 16 and 17 of Maps, records of Los Angeles County, thence Westerly along the Northernly boundary of said Tract, and following the same in all its various courses to the Southwest corner of said tract, thence Easterly along the Westernly line of Western Avenue, thence Northernly along said Westernly line of Western Avenue in a direct line to the point of beginning.

Section 3. That the proceedings for the aforesaid work shall be had under and in accordance with an Act of the Legislature of the State of California designated and known as "An Act to provide for laying out, opening, extending, widening, straightening, or closing up in whole or in part any street, square, lane, alley, court or place within municipalities, and to condemn and acquire any and all land and property necessary or convenient for that purpose," approved March 6th, 1889, and under all Acts supplementary thereto or amendatory thereof.

Section 4. That the streets and alleys heretofore referred to are public streets and alleys within the City of Torrance, State of California.

Section 5. The Superintendent of Streets shall cause to be conspicuously posted along the line of said contemplated work notices of the passage of this resolution, in the manner and in the form required by law.

Section 6. The Superintendent of Streets shall cause a notice in the manner and in the form required by law to be published by four successive insertions in the Torrance Herald, a weekly newspaper published and circulated in said City of Torrance, which is hereby designated for that purpose by the City Council of said City of Torrance, there being no daily newspaper published and circulated in said City.

ADOPTED AND APPROVED this 18th day of February, 1930.
