
ding party. The Gowns



BRIDGE COMMENT

By TED FRENGER

Contract Bridge has been generally accepted as an improvement over Auction. Basically both games are identical—but it appeals peculiarly to the quick thinking or far-sighted analyst. Bidding values are the same. As I have previously stated, the element of luck in Contract is materially reduced—but as there are so many books and magazines giving intricate values and conventions—it has



Bridge Editor and will continue to be, my desire to give you bridge enthusiasts sane, sound and simple articles merely as a guide and to arouse your interest in contract.

Contract is a game of which sound bidding is the first and main essential—you must be a bidder your partner can depend upon and give only the correct information. Many times I have been asked, how does the bidding of Contract differ from Auction? In Auction with only a bid of one, you may win the declaration and score enough tricks for game or slam, but in Contract you only score the number of tricks you and your partner have declared (i. e. towards game or below the line). And the extra tricks, if any, (not declared) are scored in the Honor column. It is easy to see that the declarer and partner failed to bid their hands, if the declaration was one spade, and five was made—

for they should have been able to bid "four and game" on the two hands. Digest all the foregoing and you will do pretty well for the week!

Here is a real tip to you beginners at Contract: wipe out that inferiority complex, otherwise you will be defeated before you start. Really Contract is a much easier game than Auction—Oh yes, it is—you must study and learn at the start, but you get definite and accurate results for whatever you put into the game.

Want to give you a few more side lights on B. B. Bill—he always turns the silent pack face up after he shuffles or "makes" the cards. That is wrong, for if it is next to the Dummy it is confusing to the Declarer, and is not necessary—it is taken for granted that the players are intelligent. The dealer's partner will shuffle the cards while dealer is dealing, then place the pack on his right (next to dealer's left) so that it is not necessary to ask "who is next dealer?" Bill also likes to complete the cut—but it is not correct unless completed by the dealers in order to make the cut accurate. —TED.


I suppose I should answer I. H.'s contribution of last week.
