## Revision of Basketball Rules Urged for Sake of Faster Game

LOS ANGELES, Apr. 3.—(UP)—A revision of basketball rules to produce a faster game and eliminate some of the advantages of the tall "string bean" type of player is advocated by Sam Barry, coach of the University of Southern California quintet.

Barry, who came to the Trojans from Iowa University and developed a championship team in his first year on California soil, has mapped out the game as he would like to see it played. Southern California fans will have a look at the Barry system in a preliminary game next winter.

"The main thing in the Barry plan is the elimination of the tip-off at center at the start of a game and after one of the teams scores a point. In place of the tip-off the ball would be thrown in from out of bounds.

"I believe this plan would make it fairer for the small athlete who can play fast basketball but who sometimes is benched because he is unable to outjump some huge rival," Barry said. "It should speed up play by eliminating the need of bringing the ball back to center and because it has a tendency to make the teams travel fast from one end of the floor to the other."

At the start of a game under the plan, the two captains would toss a coin after the fashion of football captains and the winner would throw in the ball from under its own goal. The players, scattered all over the floor, would converge toward the basket of the team holding the ball as the opening gun sounded. If the team holding the ball failed to score, the team which lost the toss would have a chance to recover the ball and start it toward its own goal.

Barry explained that the proposed plan would not eliminate jumping entirely and when two players become deadlocked over the ball the old-fashioned jump will be used to get play started again.

The national body which rules collegiate basketball has not officially commended the Barry plan

but in its last publication the board explained the proposed new style and urged that coaches give it a tryout.

## Narbonne Shows Well In Preliminary

### Ten Men Qualify For Finals In Marine League Meet To Be Held Tomorrow

Narbonne showed up well in Class A and C divisions at the Marine League preliminaries held at Torrance Tuesday afternoon. Harry Morgison took the century in 10 seconds flat, and was the only Narbonne man to qualify in the 100-yard dash. Birch of Jordan won the 220 in 22 1/5, establishing a new Marine League record. Morgison also qualifying. Courtney and Ellis took the Class A broad jump, 20 ft., 6 in. Narbonne did not qualify. Ralph Ruggate and Stanley Aspitte qualified in the high jump and at the hurdles.

Randles of Narbonne won the Class A shot-put with a heave of 39 feet. Williams set a new record for the low hurdles, running the 220 feet in 25 seconds. In the Class C division, Watanabe punted in the 50 and 100-yard dashes. Fox of Jordan won the broad jump, 17 ft., 11 in. Tawa of Narbonne qualified in the high and broad jumps. Holman, Schmidt and Lang, three young Narbonneites, qualified in the pole vault.

- Class A—Track  
880-yard run, 100-yard dash, 120-yard high hurdle, 440-yard run, 220-yard run, 220-yard low hurdle, mile run and 880-yard relay.
- Class A Field Events  
Pole vault, shot-put, high jump, and broad jump.
- Class C—Track  
50-yard dash, 100-yard dash, 120-yard low hurdles, 660-yard run, and 440-yard relay.
- Class C Field Events  
Pole vault, shot-put, high jump, and broad jump.

The results will be announced through the public address system immediately after each event.

Boyd Comstock, former track and field coach of Yale and Southern California Universities, will referee the meet. Comstock is a director of the Junior Olympic games for the Pacific Coast. C. L. Glenn, head of the physical education department of the Los Angeles City School System, and his assistant, Martin H. Trieb, will be honorary referees.

The school having the highest total scores will be awarded the permanent ownership of the beautiful Marine League cup. The contestant scoring the highest number of points will be awarded a silver trophy in the figure of an athlete. All contestants will be given medals showing their position in the event, up to fourth place.

The Torrance Chamber of Commerce appropriated \$150 to defray the cost of official badges, programs, and decorations.

The general public is invited to this outstanding athletic event according to Sig Nylander, manager of the league and local coach. An admission charge of twenty-five cents will be made to adults, and fifteen cents for children.
