MANY RECORDS FALL IN MARINE LEAGUE TRACK MEET

—which establishes a new Marine League record? Nine times the announcer brought forth these thrilling words as he broadcasted the results in the Marine League finals, Class A division, which were run off on the Torrance athletic field Friday afternoon. And nine times the thousands of spectators split the air with a thunderous yell as their favorites flashed to a spectacular finish, setting new marks for the coming generations of high school athletes to shoot at.

Aided by a fairly brisk wind from the southwest, the sprint men had a shade of an advantage in setting up new marks, but disregarding that angle entirely, there would very likely have been some new records anyway, as the track was fast and competition was red-hot. Close finishes were the rule instead of the exception, and the immense crowd that availed the grandstand and bleachers was kept on tiptoe with excitement and expectancy.

The meet reflected great credit on the management, for every event was run on schedule. There were no agonizing delays, no hitches, and the only argument came at the close of the meet, when Jordan was disqualified in the relay, the last event on the program.

As previously announced, Frank Wykoff, world's champion in the 100, ran an exhibition, paced by Bill Stokes, in 9 3-5 seconds. Jimmie DeMers, champion javelin thrower, put on a pretty show. His best mark for the afternoon was 219 feet.
