Sam Levy Named Rotary President (Continued from Page 1) He has built modern attractive store buildings on five of his down town lots; i.e., his own store building on Sartori, the Piggly Wiggly store adjoining, the Chevrolet building, the Herald building, and he is just completing a large new store building at 1384 El Prado, adjoining the Herald building, for investment. At a time when less courageous men would hesitate, Sam Levy has shown his firm confidence in the development of Torrance by erecting a major store building, 33 x 125 feet, at 1384 El Prado, in preparation for future development of his adopted city.

At Chicago in July, Sam Levy will be the Torrance Rotary Club's official delegate to the international convention. He also plans to stay over in Chicago long enough to inspect the early Fall and Winter showings at the Kuppenheimer shoe plant, both of which lines of goods the Sam Levy store sells exclusively in Torrance. Mr. Levy also attended the Rotary convention with Mrs. Levy at Cleveland three years ago.

Throughout his ten years' residence in Torrance, Sam Levy has played an important part in every movement of the betterment of the community. He has been a director of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce for six years and with J. W. Post, has taken the responsibility of raising funds to support the work of the Torrance Relief Society, Boy Scouts, and other beneficiaries in the community chest.

Forward with Ford Plan of H. Reeve

(Continued from Page 1) The plan does not meet with favor by Ford executives. The factory will be open for inspection from 1 to 5 p. m. and from 6 to 10 p. m. every day next week beginning Tuesday, when official guides of the Ford Motor Company will lead groups through the new plant.

Torrance citizens who cannot arrange to go with the party Tuesday noon, may secure the badges at the Chamber of Commerce office or at the office of the Torrance Herald, and visit the Ford plant any day during the balance of the week between the hours of 1 and 5 p. m. and 6 and 10 p. m. A big tri-motored Ford all-metal monoplane will be exhibited outside the plant.

The new plant is built on a 40-acre site opposite Terminal Island. There are two large units with a combined floor space of 550,000 square feet. A single story assembly plant 300 feet long by 301 feet wide with a two-story office portion, comprise one unit. The other which is adjacent is a two-story transfer warehouse 410 feet long and 85 feet wide.

The plant, it is stated, is required to take care of the increasing demands for Ford cars and trucks in Southern California. It has a capacity of 400 cars daily, compared with 225 that could be assembled at the Los Angeles plant which has been discontinued. Operating at capacity it would employ 2000 men who under the Ford wage scale, would receive a minimum of \$7 a day each.

A ship dredged into Corritos channel and a reinforced concrete dock 500 feet long permit ships to discharge their cargoes directly into the warehouse. Shipments of car and truck parts will be made by water from the Ford plants at Edgewater, N. J., and Chrysler, Detroit. They will be carried in Ford-owned ships, resulting in lower transportation charges and avoiding unnecessary handling.

"In selecting the site," company officials explained, "the company was motivated principally by the possibility of docking facilities. In carrying out the design and construction of the plant nothing has been subordinated to that one control idea. The railroad facilities have been constructed with a view to prompt and economical handling and with each form of transportation supplementing the other, substantial savings will be effected.

"In the design and construction of the plant every feature of the architect's skill and all the experience of the Ford Motor Company have been utilized to combine manufacturing efficiency with healthful working conditions. Machinery is the latest and most modern.

"From the time a boat docks at the transfer warehouse until the finished motor cars are driven off the assembly line, there are no unnecessary steps, no heavy manual labor that can be better accomplished by cranes, conveyors and machines.

"Much of the machinery has been developed by the Ford organization. Every machine is so geared that its operator has plenty of time to accomplish his work and yet maintain the steady rate of production necessary in the smooth operation of the plant.

"Conveyors have replaced the

hand truck of the old time factory for moving parts and materials. The final assembly is the main conveyor and on it the car grows from four pieces of steel that starts the frame to the finished automobile. To it smaller conveyors carry motors, axles and other parts which arrive at the precise moment they are needed. An interesting piece of equipment is the automatic drip, double chain enameling oven in which fenders and other parts are enamelled.

"The buildings were designed to harmonize with the prevailing type of architecture in California. They are of structural steel and white brick. The office section is trimmed with limestone and has a granite base.

"A flood of softened daylight from numerous windows, supplemented by a modern indirect lighting system illuminates every portion of the plant, and this with the most scientific system of ventilation, contribute to a mental attitude of contentment on the part of employees."
