**Competition for Husbands Less In Western States**

SACRAMENTO, Calif.—(UP)—Go west, young lady—if you seek less competition in this eternal game of getting a husband.  
For if past census figures are proof of the situation in this state, the 1920 census will show approximately 114 men to every 100 women in California.  
In other words, according to the state bureau of vital statistics women are at a premium in our sunny paradise.  
The United States as a whole isn't such a bad place for marriageable women, as a matter of fact. Records back to 1790 show an excess of males over females, with the 1920 census indicating a sex ratio of 101 men to 100 women.  
But the Pacific slope—that's the piece for the girls who want to settle down to a domestic career. Take Nevada for example, with 148 gentlemen to every 100 ladies. It leads every state in the union in this respect.  
New England states, on the other hand, should be shunned by those who would avoid competition in the matrimonial race. They show a heavy excess of women, with only 98.5 men, who must make a choice among 100 women.  
Westward the course of man takes, its way—proven by a constantly increasing sex ratio for men, starting with European countries where immigration to America has depleted male ranks so that there are usually three or four more women to every 100 men in these countries. Whenever a pioneering movement starts it is led by men, and the women stay at home.  
If immigration did not enter into calculations in the United States, there would be more women here than men, the bureau reports. It

**Proceedings Advance on Extension of Figueroa Avenue**

The extension of Figueroa street was brought a step nearer completion last week, when the City Attorney of Los Angeles entered judgment proceedings for the opening and widening of the street between Manchester avenue and 150th street, to a width of 100 feet. The city engineer recommended that he be instructed to prepare ordinances for the improvement of Figueroa from Manchester to 153rd street, which recommendation was referred by the Los Angeles city council to the public works committee.

**Police Will Go To School**

State Is Providing Instructions To Local Police On "How To Catch Criminals"

SACRAMENTO, Calif., April 21—(UP)—Torrance's police will soon be going to school.  
Instead of reading, writing and arithmetic, they will be trained in the highly scientific art of catching criminals.  
The 1929 legislature, according to James A. Johnston, chief of the state department of penology, amended the law to permit the state bureau of criminal identification to arrange for organization of police schools.  
In preparation for such schools, the bureau's board of managers have drafted a tentative course of study designed to be of great practical value, not only to local police departments, but also to sheriffs of the state and their deputies.  
The course includes four divisions, as follows:  
1. Criminal law and procedure—General principles of criminal law, state and federal laws, laws of arrest, rules of evidence.  
2. Police organization and administration—California state constitution, powers and limitations, distribution of the force, crime prevention.  
3. Criminal identification—Fingerprinting, handwriting, photography and microscopy, portrait plate, modus operandi and ballistics.  
4. Criminal investigation—The investigator, inspection of scene of crime, finger and footprints, bloodstains and other scientific evidence.  
Already the city of San Francisco has opened its "school" for police, which is under the supervision of Sergeant Patrick McGee. Police officers from other California cities are attending to learn the latest in methods of catching criminals.  
The school opens every day at 9 a. m. with the regular daily "showup" by the regular daily police during the preceding 24 hours. Following the showup there are four lectures, 15 minutes each, in order that they may cover as many subjects as possible in a period of a 6-day week.  
There are 15 men, detectives and police officers assigned from the departments to the school each week, in addition to visiting chiefs and officers from surrounding Bay cities, bringing the average daily attendance to 20 a day.  
Acting as "Professor," Sergeant McGee puts the men through an intensive course on handling firearms, disarming desperadoes and subduing criminals who "fight back." In addition to the physical tricks an officer must know, McGee has the heads of the various details give brief lectures on the topics outlined above.  
Similar schools, it is planned, will be established by cities in Central and Southern California in the near future.
