BRIDGE COMMENT
 By TED FRENCHER

Going to get the "Probable Tricks" off my mind right now. A "probable" trick is a card that will take a trick if played at the declared suit. Therefore initial Probable Trick valuation is inclusive of both high card and long card values.

The importance of precise Probable Trick valuation cannot be over-estimated. Not only the initial bid, but each re-bid thereafter shows partner a definite minimum number of Probable Tricks. The Rule of Double Valuation will be of some use, however, to determine the Probable Trick value of high cards, remember that this is basic only; apply to Quick Tricks in one hand.

3 or less Quick Tricks: Double the Q. T. value.
 If more than 3 Quick Tricks: Add 3 to the number held. To simplify, you can arrive at a rough estimate of Probable Tricks by doubling your Quick Tricks up to three and after that just count your Q. T.'s once.
