Coach Nylander's Squad Shows Up Well Against Strong Competition in District Finals

Repeating its success of last year, Torrance won the district trophy on total points, scoring 4221; Gardena second with 4127; Washington third with 3623.

Torrance placed first on points, due to the excellent performance of its squads, although pressed hard by Gardena. The district championship was decided on the combined score of the five highest point winners in each division.

Some good records were rung up, among them the performance of Craig Brown who won the opening event with a score of 40, which out-classed every contestant, even those of the senior division. Craig was an invalid a year ago, which makes his performance an astounding feat. Craig's total score for the day was 280.

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COUNTY PLANS SUPERVISION OF BEACHES

Newly Acquired Beaches at Redondo and Manhattan to Be Well Governed

Preparatory to the official taking over on May 20th, of the operation, maintenance and recreation activities of the recently purchased beach areas at Redondo and Manhattan, the county department of recreation camps and playgrounds, according to Superintendent Wadsworth, established a branch office for the beach division opposite the old dance pavilion at the corner of Marine avenue and Ocean Front at Manhattan.

"This office," Wadsworth said, "will be the headquarters for all county maintained beach areas. The assistant superintendent in charge of county beach areas, the supervisor of life guards, and the directing head of the first aid station will have their offices here.

"Two weeks from now when we begin the administration of these newly acquired beaches, activities will be carried on by a complete and going organization. The county health department will maintain the first aid station at Manhattan and a doctor and nurses will always be available when needed. At Santa Monica Community Center Hospital will supplement the work of the first aid station at that beach."

These beach areas which are shortly to come under the control of Los Angeles county, were recently purchased jointly by the state and county. It was pointed out that the property acquired comprises approximately 35 city blocks at Manhattan and about three-quarters of a mile at Redondo.

Fred W. Foley, it was declared, has been appointed beach division superintendent and Edgar H. Carroll, supervisor of life guards.

Summer Schedule to Fishing Barge Begins May Tenth

HERMOSA BEACH, May 8.—Announcement of the summer schedule for the Olympic fishing barges, operating two miles off shore here, has been announced by Capt. J. M.
