BRIDGE COMMENT By TED FRENGER

Sue and Ned are vulnerable (liable) having won the first game at four Hearts (20), no honors.

TED—Come on, our readers want some action. Whose deal—Ned? Well, what are the cards doing over there? You should know Eve that when you "make" (shuttle the silent pack) the cards, you place them on your right—then the player will know it is his deal.

TED—Say, do you folks know that Mrs. Catherine Streeter is the originator—

TED—Dash it all Ned—you know that you must always stop with yourself if you interrupt your deal to talk. Then you will not have to count the cards all around to see where you start the deal again.

NED—Thanks, old thing—to continue, Mrs. Streeter is the originator of the word Liable to be substituted for that atrocious word, Vulnerable. She has sent it back East but I doubt very much if they will accept it for the Easterners all think that nothing good or worth while can come out of the West.

TED—Is that a pun or a slam at Bill? I am in favor of giving Mrs. Streeter a vote of thanks, if only we can get away from that terrible word, "vulnerable"—reminds me of maternity wards and such like. How about a little bid, Ned?

NED (North) S-A-K-10-x-x H-K-Q D-J-x-x C-J-10-9

EVE (East) BILL (West) S-J-x-x S-x-x H-x-x-x H-J-x-x-x D-A-x D-x-x-x C-A-K-Q-x-x C-x-x-x-x

SUE (South) S-Q-x-x H-A-10-x-x D-A-Q-10-x-x C-x-x-x-x

NED—The dealer will bid one Spade. EVE—'Til bid two Clubs. SUE—I bid four Spades. BILL—No bid—Howzat? TED—Oh, yeah you're bright.

BILL—Come over here Ted. TED—Nothing doing—we will discuss the bidding later.

NED—I am content. EVE—I will pass—but can't say that I'm content. Ned makes five odd on the hand—four for game and the additional trick counts 50 in the honor column.

TED—Well Sue, you seemed so pleased with your first game, why not so joyous with Ned's "plan" as well. Go ahead and score your unearned increment.

SUE—Let's see that was four Spades—that is 120 for game and 50 for the extra trick and 700 for the rubber as it was two games running or in succession. Did I do that right?

TED—Don't be so fresh—the bidding was accurate as Ned had a count of 23 quick tricks. He could have bid No Trump, but the edge was for Spades—a case of distribution being in favor of the suit bid. Eve had more than enough for a defensive bid of two Clubs. Sue sees that her hand is a real good holder in Spades and counts her probable tricks accordingly: one trick for Q of Spades, two tricks for A-10-x-x Hearts, one trick for singleton Club, one and three-quarter tricks for K-Q-10-x-x Diamonds—total 5 1/4 tricks. She knows that Ned's bid indicated less than six tricks so she couldn't see small slam possibilities and bid correctly—four Spades. Sue, you may get up and bow.

SUE—Thanks, but don't you think that Ned could have bid two Spades or one No Trump?

TED—No, there you go—the proof is in the result. If Ned had bid two Spades you would have been safe in bidding a small slam—and that a set of one and it—Oh! you know that the distribution was not good for No Trumps and besides a good major suit is always better as an original bid than No Trump.

EVE—Why, I had five Club tricks and if you had them stopped I had a re-entry with my Ace of Diamonds and would have taken you to the cleaners. I think Ned's bid was perfect—you seem to forget Sue, that you were liable. Why not be satisfied with a 700 rubber and an over trick. You didn't see
