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### Delinquency of Youths Is Chief Source of Crime, Believes State

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UP)—The bad girls and boys of today are the criminals and convicts of tomorrow.

In the belief that if California ever expects to solve its crime problem, it must proceed through

a thorough-going study of juvenile delinquency, a statewide mental hygiene survey by a nationally-known expert is now under way.

Dr. Frederick H. Allen, director of the Child Guidance Clinic of Philadelphia is making the investigation. His activities are directed by a central state committee headed by Mrs. Anna I. Saylor, state director of social welfare.

Other members are Vierling Kersey, state director of education; Earl E. Jensen, state director of institutions; Dr. Walter M. Dickie, state director of public health; O. H. Close, superintendent of Preston School of Industry at Ione; K. J. Scudder, superintendent of Whittier State School; John D. Barry, San Francisco sociologist; Edith N. Burling, head of the Los Angeles Child Guidance Clinic; I. Irving Lipsitch, executive director of Jewish social welfare, Los Angeles; Dr. Glenn E. Myers, Los Angeles psychologist; Dr. V. H. Podstata, San Francisco physician and University of California faculty member; August Vollmer, Berkeley criminologist; Dr. Elizabeth L. Woods, Los Angeles physician, and Dr. Olga Bridgman, associate professor of psychology, University of California.

Investigation by the committees will cover state hospitals, homes for feeble-minded, child guidance clinics, private sanitariums for mental cases, work of visiting teachers, parental education, work of juvenile courts, detention homes, probation officers and other agencies dealing with child problems.

"This survey is one of the biggest things ever attempted by the state of California," says Mrs. Saylor. "The problem is what the state should do to care more adequately for a group of state wards, delinquents, mental defectives and maladjusted persons which totals, perhaps, from 75,000 to 100,000."

Illustrating the need for a mental hygiene program, Mrs. Saylor submitted a report to Governor Young quoting one eminent psychologist as follows:

"There are 2,000,000 school children in the United States who are destined for insane asylums, many of whom could be saved under a proper regime of school guidance and mental hygiene clinics. There are 10,000,000 children who suffer from abnormalities that will make them social misfits, trouble makers, delinquents and social dependents."

The state survey is being financed by a \$20,000 appropriation contained in Governor Young's budget for the biennium.




