Recipes

Best Relish
2 cups (14 oz.) ground cooked beets
1 1/2 cups apple vinegar
6% cups (2 1/2 lbs.) sugar
1 bottle pectin

Follow directions for Pepper Relish (above). Requires about 1 1/2 pounds beets. Makes about 9 eight-ounce glasses.

ORANGE SWEET PICKLE
This calls for four oranges, two cups sugar, one and one-third cups vinegar, one teaspoon whole cloves and one teaspoon whole cinnamon. Peel oranges, removing all white membrane; cut into thick slices; steam until clear and tender. Boil sugar, vinegar and spices for 25 minutes. Add fruit and simmer slowly for one hour. Place in sterilized jars and seal.

1930 PRUNE JAM
This is very economical. Two cups prunes, four oranges, one cup sugar and half a cup of water are the only ingredients. Wash prunes and cut pulp from pits. Put pulp through a food chopper. Peel oranges and cut in small pieces. Cut rind of two oranges into small pieces. Mix all together, add sugar and water; cook slowly until thick. Turn into sterilized glasses and when cool cover with paraffin.

Water Needs of Southland Vividly Told

of Los Angeles will pay \$1 per cent of the cost of bringing Colorado river water to the Southland, and the lack of an abundant supply of good water is the only deterrent to continued growth of Southern California, Mr. Harris concluded.

Legal details of the organization and operation of the Metropolitan Water District were explained by William Fox, city attorney of Glendale, which briefly are as follows: The Metropolitan Water District was created by an act of the State Legislature and is a separate political entity. At present it is composed of eleven municipalities. Others are expected to join. Each city will have one director on the governing board. Cities with assessed valuations of over \$200,000 will be entitled to one additional director for each \$200,000 in assessed valuation over \$200,000.

Voting Power
The voting power of governing board directors will be determined by assessed valuations of the municipalities they represent. One vote will be given for each ten million dollars assessed valuation. Thus, Torrance with close to thirty million valuation, will have three votes. In order that Los Angeles with its enormous assessed valuation can not gain control of the board's actions, there is a stipulation that no city, however large, may have more than fifty per cent of the votes on the board of governors. This provision is made in fairness to the smaller cities.

It was in spite of the fact that the City of Los Angeles will pay between \$1 and \$2 per cent of the total cost of the project, the speaker explained.

The amount of water allowable to each community is also proportionate to its assessed valuation. A tax limit of five cents per \$100 assessed valuation is set to cover the operating and current expenses. Bonded indebtedness allowable against the district is also limited to 15 per cent of the total assessed valuation. It is expected that the profit from the sale of water will pay the interest and retire the principal of the bonds. Bonds may be levied upon a majority vote of the people in the entire district instead of the customary two-thirds vote.

4c Tax Collected
Taxes levied so far on the eleven cities of the Metropolitan Water District amount to four cents per \$100 assessed valuation, and if Torrance joins the district, it would be required to pay this first assessment. This assessment is planned to reimburse the Los Angeles water department for preliminary expenses. Cities joining the district at a later date will be required to pay the aggregate costs to date, just as if they had joined with the original group of cities.

Dam Assured
Attorney Fox stated that the Boulder Dam was now assured. The \$10,000,000 federal appropriation has been included in the second deficiency bill and will be approved by Congress within a few days, he stated.

Dennis Approves
Mayor John Dennis stated following the introduction of the bill in favor of Torrance joining the district and would recommend. It was suggested that the proposition be included on the ballot in either the August or November elections.

Officials Introduced
Mayor Dennis welcomed the visitors and introduced local civic officials. Mayor John Porter of Los Angeles responded. Others introduced included: Mayor C. A. Dickenson of Compton, Mayor Chris Campbell of Alhambra, Mayor May B. Hopkins of Redondo, Mayor J. W. Wilson of Ontario, Mayor John O. Bodkin of Tujunga, Mayor George Love of El Segundo, Mayor Jos. R. Long of Riverside, Supervisor John Quinn of the 6th district, Wm. J. Sandborn, president of the Los Angeles City Council and A. E. "Chico" Henning, commander of the 15th Los Angeles district. Delegates from Glendale, Inglewood, Fullerton, and other cities were recognized.

A vote of thanks was given the ladies of the Women's club for the splendid dinner served.
