Torrance lads who took part in the Junior Olympic games at Moore Field, Los Angeles, last Saturday, failed to win any spectacular honors, but they gave a creditable performance, and in the junior division rated well up toward the top.

Truman Waugh, on whom the hopes of his community had been centered, failed to equal his record of May 31, when in the Los Angeles county meet he rolled up a total of 581 points. Truman's record on Saturday fell 60 points below this mark. Only in the basket ball goal throw did Truman exceed his previous mark. He hooped 14 out of 29 as against 13 the week before. His performance for the day was 14 basket ball throws out of 20, baseball throw 135 feet, 9 inches; broad jump, 7 feet 1 1/2 inches; 75-yard dash, 8 3/4 seconds; 200 yds. 3 1/2 minutes; 1000 yds. 17 1/2 minutes; 1000 yds. 10 1/2 minutes.

Dale Howe finished fourteenth with a score of 478. Dale's record was broad jump, 7 feet 2 1/2 inches; baseball throw, 172 feet, 9 inches; 19 chins, 15 basket ball goals in which he tied for third place with D. Lopez of Nordoff junior high, and the Utah champion J. Wilkes of Salt Lake. He ran the 75 in 10 1/2 seconds.

Billy Acree in the senior division rated 36th in the list with a total of 428. His performance was good but Billy had poor luck in the goal throw, getting only 9. His record was broad jump, 8 feet 1 inch; baseball throw 201 feet, 2 inches; 20 chins, 9 goal throws, and he ran the 75 in 8 seconds flat.
