CIVIC CONCERT TOMORROW NIGHT

FOREMOST SOUTHLAND ARTISTS ON PROGRAM AT HIGH SCHOOL

Community Wide Tribute To Wanda Stachowicz To Be Featured By Appearance of Outstanding Musicians and Dramatist of Nation

Chamber of Commerce Sponsoring Celebration To Which Public Is Invited, Italian Fete in School Patio Following Concert

TORRANCE—the Modern Industrial City,—known throughout the nation for its 46 humming factories and vast petroleum resources, will tomorrow night play a new role in civic achievement.

The elaborate and artistic concert program arranged as the home-coming tribute to this city's illustrious daughter, Miss Wanda Stachowicz, will include many of the Southland's most gifted and talented artists.

The concert program, which is published in detail in another column of this edition, will begin at 8:15 p.m. in the Torrance High school auditorium.

While Miss Stachowicz' fame as an opera singer is well known throughout Europe, the informal response to the concert in her honor tomorrow evening, will be her first appearance in America.

Critics of the opera in Italy have unstintingly praised Miss Stachowicz ever since her debut a year and a half ago in Milan.

The civic celebration honoring Miss Wanda Stachowicz' return to Torrance following her climb to success in the realm of Italian opera is sponsored and financed entirely by the Torrance Chamber of Commerce.

Miss Wanda Stachowicz is best known to a host of Torrance friends as a charming little girl with a sweet voice.


Her formal American debut has not been announced by her booking agent in New York, as she expects to take an extended rest with her parents in Torrance.
