(Continued from Page 1) day of rest but we go to the Arc de Triomphe in the afternoon to put a wreath on the Unknown Soldier's tomb. Tomorrow, Sunday, rest or go to church. Twelve noon, lunch; 2:15 sightseeing trip in bus to Sacre Coeur; dinner at 7 a.m., then pack luggage. We have a large printed program of three pages of our entire stay here in France.

"Ho! Ho! Here comes Santa Claus—very little while we hear the crack of a whip, horses' hoofs pounding the pavement and bells tinkling—a real French something goes by—don't know what the outfit is for; and auto horns are a joke. They are all those little tinny ones. Once in a while we hear a deep toned horn. There are many auto horns in Paris but traveling for five hours on the train only saw about half a dozen on the roads.

Grateful for Trip
"Oh! My what a funny part of the world. Say, we that live in America are millionaires. This surely is a country for some Henry Ford to make millions on bicycles as that seems to be the principal means of locomotion.

"We are all so grateful to everyone, both French and Americans that they are making our glad trip such an enjoyable one. And the American steamer we came over on, is almost entirely manned by Germans and we could not have received any more kindness, courtesy and comfort than they gave us and last, but not least, in thanks to our very own United States of America that has made this wonderful pilgrimage possible."


