## Reverse Colors In Auto Plates for Next Year

SACRAMENTO, July 2. (Special)—The 1931 colors for automobile license plates will be exactly the same as this year except that they will be reversed, the Division of Motor Vehicles announced today.

Instead of black letters and numbers on an orange background, it was stated, orange letters will appear on a black background, just as they were in 1929.

Exhaustive tests for visibility, the division's announcement said, have proven beyond all doubt that these colors are the most satisfactory and that numbers may be read at a greater distance than with any other combination.

The only change in the general appearance of next year's plate will be the elimination of the dashes between numerals and letters. This will be done to improve the plate's appearance and will not decrease visibility.

The plates will be 13 1/2 inches long and 6 1/2 inches wide as provided by the motor vehicle act. They will be manufactured of the same grade of 24-gauge steel.

The same combination of letters and numerals that has proved so satisfactory in the last two years will be used. The division announced that a maximum of 2,500,000 plates of not more than six characters may be issued with this arrangement.

An initial order for 1,950,000 piggyback car plates has been placed. The plates will be manufactured by the Kittle Manufacturing Company of Los Angeles at a price of 12 1/2 cents per pair.

Plate assignments are now being prepared for the various branch offices of the division.

## Local Graduate Gets Position in N. Y. Laboratories

Jack Hutton of Torrance, a mechanical engineer of the 1930 graduating class of the College of Engineering of the University of Southern California, has been employed by the Bell Laboratories of New York according to Philip S. Blegler, dean of the S. C. college.

Five other Trojan students have been employed by the same company. They are Clair Black, Edward McCherter, Albert Nelson, John Ragsdale, and Sidney Rosen, all electrical engineers.

Over three-fourths of the electrical engineers of the 1930 Trojan class have already been employed by nationally-known electric companies stated Dean Blegler. They include such concerns as the General Electric company at Schenectady, the Canadian General Electric company at Toronto, and the R.C.A. Victor corporation at Camden, N. J.

Thirty-seven seniors graduated from the S. C. College of Engineering which is comprised of four main divisions, chemical, electrical, mechanical, and petroleum engineering.

**THE TOPSFIELD HOUSE H-133**

By DUNCAN HUNTER, Architect, New York

Much of our later so-called Colonial houses are not Colonial or early American, or anything of the kind—they are boxes with more or less, often less, Colonial details stuck on here and there. The character of the early houses is entirely lacking, even in instances where the detail is good—that is, we might say accurately taken from old examples—a sorry lack of the vigor and spirit of the house is conspicuous. The later type of adaptations of the early houses run on the average, to pale washed out, and unhealthy imitations.

In the early houses the roofs, the masses and the materials were handled in a vigorous way—even the details showed strong character.

The Topsfeld is a modern adaptation of the early American type—the steep pitched roof, the overhangs, the masses and the details follow the old spirit. The plan arrangement is livable and practical to meet modern conditions.

The Topsfeld lists as follows:  
 Basement: Recreation room, laundry, heater space, etc.  
 First floor: Entrance hall with coat closet, living room, dining room, study, kitchen and a one-car motor room.  
 Second floor: Three bed rooms,  
 bath, wardrobes and closets.  
 Third floor: A large attic reached by ceiling stairway.  
 Ceiling heights: Basement, seven feet; first floor, eight feet; second floor, eight feet.  
 Exposure: The plans as shown are for a lot facing south or west. For a lot facing north or east the plans should be reversed.  
 Lot size: House frontage, 52 feet 6 inches; side clearance, left 3 feet, right four feet 6 inches; lot frontage, minimum 60 feet.  
 Construction: Exterior walls, front brick, other frame; roof, shingles; foundation, concrete; windows, double hung, with shutters; doors, wood, to special details.  
 Interiors: Floors, wood; walls, plaster; ceilings, plaster; kitchen, composition tile; bath room, tile.
