Reckless Drivers Beware of Cops This Week-End

SACRAMENTO, July 3 (Special)—Another week-end of road-breaking traffic for the holiday period Friday, July 4th to Monday, July 7th, with a consequent need of the most careful driving was predicted today by the California Highway Patrol.

It was announced the patrol has received information that thousands of motorists will leave for long trips Thursday afternoon and Friday morning having made arrangements to absent themselves from the usual half-day of work on Saturday.

This condition, it was announced, will prevail throughout the state. Superintendent Eugene W. Bicknell has issued orders that there shall be no days off for any officer during this emergency period and that every available man, including inspectors and captains will be on duty.

The night patrol will be on duty in practically every county during the period. Roads leading to mountain and seaside resorts will be patrolled carefully.

"Casualties were lighter than we anticipated during the recent Memorial day week-end," Bicknell stated. "We believe this partly due to the co-operation we received from the public. We hope we shall continue to have this co-operation during the coming emergency period." After all, the result is entirely up to the public.

STATE FAIR TO HALT PROGRESS FOR 80 YEARS

Gala Program is Planned for Portrayal of California's Golden Years

SACRAMENTO.—California's record of progress since its admission into the Union eighty years ago will be strikingly portrayed at the State Fair which opens in Sacramento August 30, and continues for nine days.

The theme "Eighty Years of Progress" was selected by the directors of the exposition as typical of the advance made by the state in agriculture, horticulture, manufacturing, education and other lines of enterprise since 1850.

In addition to exhibits by 54 California counties, the exposition will be featured with displays from a number of western states and the Republic of Mexico. On the opening day, a new State Fair, 1930 stock building will be dedicated. This is the fourth of a series of large permanent structures to be erected on the fair grounds in Sacramento.

"Forty-Niners" Present

F. A. Condes of Chino, president of the exposition, predicts that the attendance at the exposition this year will pass the 500,000 total. Last year it was 431,000, a new record for the State Fair.

A new feature of the exposition, announced by Charles W. Palma, will be competitive exhibition trials by California (farmers) and patriotic organizations. A first prize of \$500 is offered. Another feature will be the gathering of all surviving "Forty-Niners"—men and women who were in California as children in the years 1849 and 1850.
