

Chaperone of Party Honored by Shower

Modern Quality--The Broadside



THE BROADSIDE HOUSE H-119

By DUNCAN HUNTER, Architect New York

The substantial quality and true worth of a home designed in the modern manner—not the makeshift type of modern—appeals to those of us who seek distinction with character in our homes, for us who tire of the commonplace and want something new and refreshing. The Broadside is such a type. The broad front of bricks, the expansive roof, the deeply recessed entrance and the general symmetrical arrangement expresses character and balanced dignity, nothing "tippy" here.

From the orderly arrangement of the design we expect to find a livable layout in the plan—just so—and complete to the last detail. Four master's bed rooms with two baths, a wardrobe and plenty of closets, a study, a two-car motor room and the servant's quarters connecting with the kitchen so that they are isolated. The car is accessible from the dining room without passing through the service part of the house. The large recreation room in the basement has a fireplace and gives the host the liberty he needs for poker parties and the like.

The Broadside tabulates: Basement: Recreation room, laundry, cold room, etc. First floor: Entrance hall with two coat closets, living room, study, dining room, kitchen and a two-car motor room. Second floor: Four bed rooms, two baths, wardrobe, closets, servant's room and bath. Large storage space reached by ceiling stairway.

Ceiling heights: Basement, seven feet; first floor, eight feet six inches; second floor, eight feet. Exposure: The plans as shown are for a lot facing South or West. For a lot facing North or East the plans should be reversed. Lot size: House frontage, 70 feet; side clearance, left 11 feet, right 9 feet; lot frontage, minimum 90 feet.

Construction: Exterior walls, brick; roof, slate; foundation, concrete; windows, steel casements, lead doors, wood, to special details. Interiors: Floors, wood for linoleum finish; walls, plaster; ceilings, plaster, with cornices; kitchen, composition tile; bath room, tile; and, steam heat, gas and electric wiring. Cubature, 37,900 cubic feet. Approximate cost, \$13,000. Complete working plans and specifications of this house are available for a nominal sum.
