



### Sensational Ninth Inning Rally By Blues Beats Pasadena, 8-7

Those dag-gone Blues, they were licked twice last Sunday but they wouldn't stay licked. In the most spectacular finish they have put on in months they trimmed the Pasadena Sportland club by a score of 8 to 7 with a ninth inning rally that slipped over three runs and left two more on base with nobody out.

It was the fifth Draper, pitching for the Sportland club, had the Blues cutting out of his mitt. Three measly bingles were all they could get off him, and the score was 4 to 0 in the visitors' favor.

Fifth Starts Fireworks A close decision at the plate which gave Pasadena its fourth run was the spark that started the works in Torrance's half of the fifth. Flinker hit to short and was out at first. Atwood got in front of a pitched ball and took first. Yelovich came through with a single and Claybourn got his second hit for the day.

With three men on, the stage was set for a clean-up. Wolfe was set down on strikes, and it looked as if Draper was about to pull out of a nasty situation, when young Zeller, the new right fielder, stepped up and whanged out a triple. He scored on Bouett's single and the score was all even.

Atwood drew a pass in the next frame and Yelovich boosted him to second with a single. Claybourn's double came in mighty handy and Atwood scored putting Torrance in the lead.

But not for long. In the seventh Yelovich was touched for four hits, one of them a double and three runs came in, making the count Sportland, 7; Torrance, 5.

Draper Hit on Wrist Neither team scored in the eighth, although Sportland had three men on with one out, in their half, and was all set for a clean-up when Johnny Duczau robbed Norton on a line drive and tossed to Bouett for a double play retiring the side with no runs.

Johnny saved the day once more in the ninth when three men were on with two out, by taking Bapst's single for the third out.

Draper, batting in the ninth, was hit on the wrist by one Yelovich's starts, but whether this contributed to Sportland's downfall in the last inning is unknown. He appeared to have all the old steam and control that he had displayed all along.

Blues Change Tactics The real inside of the affair was the sudden and complete change of tactics on the part of the Blues. From a slashing hit and run program, the Blues started a bunting rally.

Yelovich helped to win his own game when he laced out a triple to start the fray. Claybourn, Wolfe and Zeller laid down three bunts in a row which so upset the Sportland boys that Yelovich scored and three were on base with no one out. Bouett cleaned up with a double and the game twice lost was in the bag for the Blues.

Wolfe had a great day at third, getting six fielding chances, two hits and a run. He got a good hand from the spectators on his running catch of Cox's foul fly back of the Pasadena players' bench.

Fred Flinker in center covered a lot of territory and made three great put-outs. It is hard to say whether Fred is a better pitcher or outfielder as he shows up well in either position.

Atwood in Charge Rennie was considerable help to Yelovich, by blocking some of the hits wide ones. Only one did a pitched ball get past Paul.

Claybourn and Yelovich lead the batting list. Claybourn got four and John three. Harry Atwood was in charge of the team for the day, and gave the line-up a shaking up, with apparently good results.
