Home Nursing Hints

ARTICLE NO. 2

After the nurse, professional or member of the household, has taken charge of the patient, the surroundings of the sick room must first be given close attention. Items such as ventilation, temperature, lighting, disposal of refuse and general cleanliness, and the neatness and order of the sick room, must first be looked after.

Let us take up ventilation first. Keep the air your patient breathes as pure as possible. Let the air circulate at all times, but be careful that a draught does not strike the patient as it may chill him. Pure air means air free from germs and gasses.

Proper Lighting

By keeping the air in the sick room in constant circulation, with a temperature of from 64 to 70 degrees Fahrenheit, you have the ideal sick room temperature. Keep the windows open from the top and bottom. This will cause an entire circulation throughout the room. While the room is being ventilated, be sure and keep the patient well covered, for when we are ill our vitality is very low, and we are prone to "catch cold," therefore, the extra precaution. To prevent impurities in the air, be sure that all waste matter such as, soiled dressings and refuse are disposed of immediately.

Now, as to lighting the patient's room. Through the day when natural light is obtainable, place the bed in such a position that the light does not glare directly into the eyes. Don't be afraid to let the sunshine flow into the room, as it is the greatest germ killer we have, and it makes the sick room cheery and bright. Now as to night lighting. If the light is directly in the center of the ceiling, place a shade so the rays do not reach the patient's eyes, or obtain a light cord, which can be purchased anywhere for a very small amount, and extend it to the head of the bed, also using a shade. Remember, direct light shining into a patient's eyes is always annoying.

Cleanliness Vital

Cleanliness as to floors, walls, ceilings, furnishings and utensils is equally important as lighting a sick room. Keep the room as immaculate as possible, never allowing glasses or dishes around, as they attract flies and other insects. Filth attracts germs, and most all germs are disease producing.




