ULTIMATUM ON HIGHWAY FROM MEEK

Wilmington Given Final Decision on Width for Route

An ultimatum to the effect that the state will not start construction on the extension of the Coast Roosevelt Highway in Wilmington along O and N streets unless a roadway width of at least 76 feet is obtained was delivered in that city Monday by B. B. Meek, state director of Public Works, and George Cortleyou, district state highway engineer.

This statement clarifies the various problems that have complicated the much-debated O and N street and State street in Long Beach Coast highway extension. It is now up to Wilmington and no further compromise will be obtained from the state, Mr. Meek declared.

To Reconsider Action

The 80-foot street with 56-foot roadway, as proposed by the O and N Street Improvement Association will not be considered, the state officials said. Furthermore, if the state cannot obtain the desired wider highway another route will be selected. If this is done, Mr. Meek continued, Wilmington will have no voice in the matter.

It was with a firm conviction that immediate action is necessary if these two important Wilmington and Long Beach streets are improved with state and county aid that the Wilmington delegation, who heard the state's decision, returned from the conference. To this end members of the delegation plan to start immediate action to overcome previous Wilmington opposition to the wider highway. A special meeting to consider the matter has been called by members of the East Wilmington late this week. It will be proposed that the association rescind its indorsement of an 80-foot highway and approve the 100-foot roadway desired by the county and state.

Home Nursing Hints

By GRACE L. SMITH, R. N. In caring for a sick person, the bed is always given close attention as to cleanliness and comfort for the patient's sake, for he spends most of his time in it.

The necessary requirements for the sick bed are as follows: A very good mattress, one that is smooth and level; one large bed pad, two large sheets, one small draw sheet, one rubber draw sheet, two blankets, two pillows and two pillow cases. Have all of these materials ready before you start in to make the bed, and work from one side only. When that side is complete go to the other side and finish. In this way the entire bed is made with only one trip around it.

Move the patient gently to the opposite side from which you are going to work and place the lower sheet full length on the bed with the middle fold of the sheet in the center of the bed. See that the lower sheet is well tucked in on both sides. Then place the prevent wrinkles. Block the corners at head and bottom, just as you would wrap up a package. Next place the rubber draw sheet from the shoulder area to the knees and tuck this in, and follow with the linen draw sheet in the same way.

How To Hold Pillows

Now roll your patient over onto the clean linen, drawing the soiled linen through at the same time you draw the clean linen through, and make the other side of the bed in exactly the same manner. During the changing of the lower sheet the patient is never uncovered.

Place the top sheet first, then follow with your blankets, but be careful not to tuck them in too tightly at the bottom for it makes the patient's feet very uncomfortable as there is no room for movement. Then the covers and your patient is clean and comfortably fixed with the minimum of effort and movement.

So often I have seen women, when changing the pillow case, hold the pillow between their teeth, while struggling to get the case on. This is not only dangerous from the standpoint of infection, but it is also not the best thing in the world for the teeth. Place the pillow on a table or bed and draw the slip over.

Comfort Hints

To place a pillow under a patient's head, place your right hand under his left shoulder, raise him gently and place the pillow in a comfortable position under the head and shoulders. Correct placing of pillows has a great deal to do with the comfort of the patient. The pillows will get hot, knotty and wrinkled, but it is so easy to take them out at frequent intervals, stuff the feathers around, turn it over, smooth it, and replace it under the patient. A pillow tucked behind the back acts as a great support and while he is lying on his back, a pillow under the knees is even more comfortable.

TOURISTS IN STATE HAVE SET RECORD

Annual Increase of 27.4 Per Cent in Motor Entries, Report

An outline of facts concerning Southern California's summer tourist business, released this week by the All-Year club, Southern California's national tourist advertising organization, reveals that out-of-state motor arrivals for June, 1930, show an increase of 23,860 persons, or 192 per cent over June, 1923.

"This registers an annual average increase of 27.4 per cent during the last seven years," W. E. Jeffries, chairman of the executive committee of the All-Year club, said yesterday.

"During last month a total of 36,420 out-of-state motor tourists arrived directly in Southern California via Daggoit, Blythe and Yuma gateways. This number averages 1214 who 'checked in' daily during the 30 days of June at the three southern border stations of the California Department of Agriculture.

"The total number for June, 1923, two years after the All-Year club was started, amounted to 12,460. A total of 10,838 motor tourists from other states arrived in California during the last month in 37,285 autos, according to the accurate check at the 23 border inspection stations.

"Surveys show that tourists' expenditures in Southern California last month amounted to \$24,927,460. A total of 10,838 motor tourists spent by each of the 114,500 out-of-state visitors who arrived via all channels of transportation," he said.

REGISTRATION CHECKED
