Ninth Hollywood Bowl Season Nearing Close

The ninth annual season of the "Symphonies Under the Stars" in the Hollywood Bowl is rapidly drawing to a close. The yearly musical festival, in the hills back of the film capital, is now in its fifth week, and only three more weeks remain.

To date the season has been unusually successful, and Glenn M. Tinnial, business manager of the Bowl, confidently expects all attendance records to be shattered by the end of the season. Music lovers of Southern California have responded eagerly to the carefully selected programs, and critics have been unanimous in praising the concerts, the directors, and the solo artists.

Bernardino Molinari, noted Italian conductor, is now in the

third week of his four-week engagement, and August 16 will mark his final appearance. He will be followed by Pietro Cimini, formerly of the Chicago Civic opera, who will be guest conductor for one night, and by Enrico Arbos, noted Spanish director, who will finish out the season.

The remaining soloists on the program include Percy Grainger, pianist-composer, who will appear Friday (August 8) playing three of his own compositions; Nathan Stewart, baritone, second of the Audition winners, who appears Saturday (August 9); the Michio Ito ballet of 125 dancers August 15; Kathleen Parlow, noted violinist, August 22; and Alfred Wallenstein, America's leading cellist, and a former Los Angeles resident, August 29.

HOLLYWOOD, (UP)—Faces new to the cinema art although some were prominent in other lines of activity will appear before the movie public during the next few months.

An announcement at Fox Film Studios today was to the effect that much youthful talent was at large on the lot—and that most of it will be used in pictures.

Newcomers who will make their debut in the near future include Michael Bartlett, recently arrived in Hollywood from the Princeton campus; Claire Luce, Broadway, London and Paris actress; Louise Huntington, prominent as a Broadway player; Leslie Mae, a tiny blonde dancer, and Nancy Kelly, who deserted vaudeville for the films.

Bartlett already has a prominent role selected for him as he will head the cast of "The Heartbreaker." The others will have leading or prominent supporting roles in current productions.

Other young aspirants hitherto unknown who are clicking in the Fox-Movietone productions are John Wayne, who a short time ago played on the University of Southern California football team, and Jane Keith, University of Chicago girl, who, until a few months ago, thought she was going to pursue a career as a secretary.

Wayne has the lead in Director Rouben M. Mervin's picture of pioneer days, "The Big Trail." Miss Keith plays the feminine lead in "The Sea Wolf," directed by Alfred Santell.

Edward Everett Horton, veteran stage and screen actor, has a record of extreme activity right through the coming of the talkies and the influx of new talent to Hollywood. He played five consecutive years in the same theatre before devoting all of his time to the talkies—after they were established. His latest role is in "Holiday," featuring Ann Harding.

an outstanding community park playground. It is known here that the funds are available and such a purchase would not necessitate the issuance of bonds. The county is also understood to be in a position to receive state aid on the project.

Help Night Ball Team

The San Pedro Chamber has also urged the purchase of the Royal Palms, for park purposes, pending that it would be desirable to buy from 700 to 800 acres lying between San Pedro and Pulos Verdes estates. This proposed park would be the only county recreation spot in this district and would include a large amount of valuable ocean frontage. A majority of the property in the tract is owned by the Sepulveda family. It includes the Royal Palms Country club with its 18-hole golf course and a widely known seaside palm grove.

The directors voted to donate \$75 to the maintenance of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce night indoor baseball team, managed by Ed Tansey. This sum will be expended for uniforms and equipment. Tansey also has another night ball team, but the Chamber's nine is a separate organization.

The membership of the Great A. & P. store here was accepted and the organization thanked for their spirit of cooperation.

President-elect W. Rufus Page was installed in office after Harry H. Dolley, retiring president, had expressed his gratitude for the support of the board during his term in office. In turn, the board passed a unanimous vote of appreciation to Mr. Dolley for his fine services in behalf of the city.
