RED SOX MAY NAB PENNANT FROM LEAGUE

With a record of 16 games won as against only four defeats, the Torrance Red Sox, formerly the Tansey Barbers, are in the final act of their race for the Compton Indoor League pennant next week.

Dodge Marathon Run Checked by Map Shown Here

Paul and Murray Keeping Record of Lengthy Trips Over U. S.
