## HOME-CANNED FISH IS FATAL TO GIRL HERE

### Lupo Family Victims of Deadly Botulism Poisoning

A tragic echo of the wave of botulism poisoning which swept the country several years ago with canned ripe olives as the poisoning agent occurred in Keystone Friday when a prominent Italian-American family was stricken with the deadly malady.

This time some home-canned tuna fish was the agent that carried the poison to the Lupo family at 215 Vermont street, Keystone. As a result, beautiful 18-year-old Josephine Lupo is dead; her mother, Mrs. Paul Lupo, is in the Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial Hospital in a critical condition and grandfather, Leonardo Vempignia is at the Lupo home seriously ill.

Physicians and hospital attendants said today that Mrs. Lupo's condition was unchanged and, if anything, was even more serious. It was also reported that Joe Lupo, a son, was stricken last night with the poison and is believed to be suffering from a form of paralysis of the throat and larynx. He is confined at the home with the grandfather. Funeral services for Josephine Lupo will be held Saturday morning at 9 o'clock at the Catholic church here, according to Stone & Myers.

Inquest to be held Josephine died at the hospital here at 12:30 o'clock Monday. Mrs. Lupo is receiving almost constant medical attention. Grandfather Vempignia was at the hospital for a day but he wanted to be at home so to ease his mind he was returned to the Lupo home where he is being treated. Mr. Paul Lupo, although he ate some of the fish, is said not to have been affected. It is reported that a friend brought the Lupos a large tuna which was too large for just one meal. Mrs. Lupo canned it but in some way the fish became impregnated with botulism poison. Josephine Lupo received her elementary education at the Carson street school later attending the Torrance High School graduating in the summer class of 1929. She was a popular girl while in school among her classmates, having a very sunny disposition.

Left to mourn her are her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Lupo, two sisters, Kate and Virginia and one brother, Joe, as well as a host of friends.

## Dinner and Magic Show Given Tonight


