Prospects Good for Erection of Federal Building

Local Committee Receives Crail's Assurance

Prospects are very bright for a Federal building in Torrance to house the postoffice, according to Postmaster Alfred Gourdier, who with a committee of four other citizens interviewed Congressman Joe Crail here this week before the congressman spoke at a banquet in his honor.

"I cannot say very much about the movement to obtain a new postoffice building," the postmaster declared. "I can state that Torrance stands a very good chance of securing a Federal headquarters here in the near future."

It is known that the Postoffice Department is in favor of constructing postoffices how while labor is plentiful. A ten-year program was recently adopted by Congress, but the department is of the opinion that the major portion of the construction program could be done at the present time.

President Hoover's view of the matter is not definitely known, but it is believed that he would acquiesce in the department's request because of the relief such a program would afford to unemployment.

The committee who interviewed Congressman Crail on the matter was composed of George Nell, Wallace Post, Sam Levy, W. Rufus Page, Carl Hyde and Mr. Gourdier. They gave evidence to the distinguished visitor that will be highly advantageous to the cause of a Federal building here, it is believed.

Postmaster Gourdier showed that the postoffice is dispensing between \$30,000 and \$32,000 worth of stamps per year now. A postoffice regulation states that new buildings will only be constructed where an office is doing at least \$20,000 in stamp business per year. Crail assured the committee he would help the move.

Cotton Plant Is On Display Here

A fine specimen of the long staple blooming cotton is on display in G. L. Morris' show window at 1611 Cabrillo avenue. The plant was brought to Torrance by Morris from his 40-acre plantation in the San Joaquin Valley near Tulare. It is deriving its sustenance from a box of ordinary gravel.

Morris reports that John Harman, known to a number of Torrance residents, is farming the plantation and that a big yield is expected. The price, however, is very low. It takes 1300 pounds of cotton to make one standard bale of 500 pounds of ginned cotton, he said.
