City Gives Co. Right To Work on Weston St.

Will Complete South Leg of Sepulveda Highway in Torrance

A resolution granting consent of the city council of Torrance to the County Board of Supervisors to open, widen and improve portions of Weston street lying within the boundaries of the city was passed by the council Tuesday night. This will permit the county to start the work this fall on the south leg of the Sepulveda boulevard which will terminate at Lecouvreur street in Wilmington.

The work is to be done in the manner set forth in the majority petition for the improvement now on file with the County Road Commissioner and the paving will be asphalt concrete, 40 feet wide and eight inches deep. The road to be improved is about a mile and a quarter long, according to City Engineer Frank Leonard. Mayor John Dennis reported that the county will pay 40 per cent of the cost.

The opening of Weston street through Torrance has been under consideration for the past four years. Mayor Dennis said at council meeting, and this is the best plan available to complete it at the present time.


