LOMITA.—An interesting course is in store for those adults who attend Mrs. Effie Jane Hayden-Lentart's millinery classes at the Lomita and Orange street elementary schools. With the aid of carefully worked-out charts, color harmony will be discussed, and pupils taught to analyze type and coloring, and to evolve designs that will emphasize their good points.
