MANY PRIZES ARE OFFERED TO GOLFERS

Legion's "Blind Bogey" Meet Starts October 23 to Run for 3 Days

More than \$50 in merchandise prizes will be distributed to the winners of the local American Legion's "blind bogey" minny golf tournament at the West Babylon links, October 23, 24 and 25, according to Lou Deisinger, who is chairman of the tournament committee.

Tickets for the tourney are being sold by members of the local post and players may run off their names any time during the three days. A "blind bogey" tourney means that after all contestants have shot their games at handicaps fixed by themselves, a number between 40 and 50, inclusively, will be drawn by the tourney committee and this will be the winning figure. Scores nearest that number will be awarded the prizes. Handicaps can be figured by players, who will estimate the winning number and judge their handicaps accordingly. In case of any ties, the games will be played off the following week by the tying players who will use the same handicaps as they did in the contest.

The event is working hard to make the event a sporting meet of importance throughout the city and a large number of miniature golf stars are expected to compete for the prizes. However, as the tourney is a "blind bogey," Deisinger points out that all players have an equal chance to win.

MORE JUNIOR COLLEGES TO BE PROPOSED

SACRAMENTO, (UP)—Establishment of additional junior colleges in California will be proposed to the next legislature by Vierling Kersey, state superintendent of public instruction, he announced.

"The time is coming when every high school graduate will demand a junior college education," Kersey declared. "Smaller communities should have the same educational opportunity as the big cities. District junior colleges will save parents considerable money in educating their children, while keeping the children at home during their education."

Requirements for establishment of a junior college district are now too severe to allow smaller counties to invest them, Kersey said.
