## Local Fire Chief Urges Approval of Pension Fund

Presenting a unified front in every section of California for the passage of Proposition No. 2, the "Firemen's Pension Measure," at the polls November 4, fire chiefs and firemen this week began an educational campaign on the issue for the benefit of the voters, seeking to acquaint them with the vital importance of the insurance-creating legislation.

Members of the local fire department are sharing in the statewide campaign. Local Fire Chief J. P. Hannebrink is urging the citizens of Torrance to vote "yes" on the amendment. "We expect that the voters of California will approve Proposition No. 2 whole-heartedly once they are familiar with its progressive, humane and utterly fair legislation. Proposition No. 2 provides for the allocation of a sum from the State Treasury equal to not more than one-half of the money derived from the tax upon gross fire insurance premiums to be distributed proportionately by the Legislature among all local fire-
