



A program of instructive lectures and discussion has been laid out by the Southern California Water Study association, formed at Lynwood, October 18. Meetings will be held bi-weekly in various cities, as most communities have come to the point that their water problems must be solved in the near future. The next meeting will be held next Saturday, November 1, in the school building at Signal Hill, Walnut avenue and 23rd street, at 2 p. m. E. C. Eaton, chief engineer of the Los Angeles county flood control district, will read a paper on "Conservation by Spreading Areas," and Franklin Thomas of the California Institute of Technology, will speak on "Treatment of Sewage in Relation to Conservation."

Here's Way To Come West






