

## Keystone's Main Street To Be Opened Nov. 8 with Celebration


KEYSTONE.—James T. Aganjanian, of San Pedro, owner of the Harbor Stage Company, gave an interesting account of his progress in securing a bus service from the harbor to Los Angeles via Keystone at the regular meeting of the Keystone Chamber of Commerce held Saturday night. Aganjanian was questioned by an examiner for the state railway commission for 13 hours.

Progress was reported by Charles A. Brazee, president of the chamber, of the committee work in regard to the proposed street celebration on November 8 at which time the paying project of Main street will be completed. New developments for this event were announced. One hundred dollars has been subscribed by individuals to finance the proposition. Speakers will be present, a 20-piece drill team from the American Legion in Gardena, vaudeville acts, and an orchestra from Royal Palms will be added features to the program. A gray street parade will be the opening event, with the band, drill teams, orchestra, dignitaries, and privately owned cars decorated for that night all lending their part to the success of the event. A platform will be constructed in front of Booster's hall temporarily for the speaking and entertainment. A portion of the street will be roped off for street dancing with the orchestra from Royal Palms furnishing the music.

A letter from the Los Angeles Board of Education was read in which it stated that the boundary line between the Phineas Banning High school at Wilmington and the Torrance High school was Harbor boulevard commonly known as Main street. A bus will be furnished pupils who wish to attend Torrance High school if it is found necessary. A bus is now serving this district taking students to Wilmington and those attending Torrance High school do not have any way of getting to and from school, many walking this distance. After a short discussion on this matter Roy Berry was appointed by the chair to take care of this matter, checking up on the students now attending the Torrance school.

December 11 has been set for the date that the Keystone chamber of Commerce will entertain the Harbor District Chamber of Commerce here. The business session will be held at Carson street school with the usual dinner served at Booster's hall by the Women's Club of Keystone serving. Another subject receiving discussion was the petition which was presented to the chamber for endorsement opposing the vendors and peddlers from Main street or any side street within 800 feet from Main street.
