Special Armistice Day program will be given at the Torrance theater next Sunday morning, November 9, beginning at 10 o'clock. It will be an "open session" of the Torrance Men's Bible class.

Lieutenant Reuben W. Shrum, chaplain of the U. S. S. West Virginia, will deliver the Armistice Day address. Lt. Chaplain Shrum is a graduate of Bucknell University and Princeton Theological Seminary. He was pastor of the United-Methodist church at Jersey City, N. J., but a short time when he entered the Navy service and was commissioned as a chaplain during the war.

He was ordered to the U. S. S. Pittsburgh in 1918, at the time when that vessel was the flagship of the American Naval forces in European waters. Chaplain Shrum was attached to the cruiser until 1921, during which time the Pittsburgh took part in the Allied occupation of Constantinople following the Smyrna disaster. He also saw service aboard the presidential yacht, the U. S. S. Mayflower, until President Hoover ordered the vessel out of commission.

give a 30-minute concert of both sacred and military music at the opening of the program. At a patriotic feature, Bugler Gamble will present a series of Navy bugle calls and the ship's outstanding soloist will sing a group of patriotic songs.

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Hospital Needs Help From All Citizens

L. A. General hospital of \$5.53 and ours last year was \$6.07. The average of 100 hospitals last year was \$6.52 and many of them inferior to our own. The better hospitals in Southern California have a cost rate from \$7.00 up. Compare again the General hospital with the student nurses, no taxes to pay, no insurance, cheap light, water and fuel; no interest charge, while our hospital, with only a few cents a day more cost, had none but graduate experienced nurses, paid \$971 taxes, etc.

"Another criticism heard about our hospital is that it does not do enough charity. At first the board ruled we would accept charity cases within a radius of one mile, but experience soon taught that between charity and dead-beats we would soon be absolutely bankrupt and the limit was set for the actual city of Torrance. Last year the charity amounted to over \$3000. No proper cases have been refused by the hospital and many people have been treated there who should have paid but who have not. Because a charity case goes to the General hospital, Children's hospital or school clinic, is no evidence that the case was refused in our hospital. To receive charity in our hospital the attending doctor must agree to charge the patient nothing for his services, so it is largely up to the doctors of the community how much charity is done in our hospital," Dr. Lancaster concluded.

Old Landmark is Destroyed By Fire

LOMITA.—When fire completely destroyed the old Community church building on Brethren street early last Friday morning, it razed Lomita's oldest landmark. Oldtimers watched the flames with tears in their eyes, remembering the early days—days of real sacrifice—when Lomita, sparsely settled and not too affluent, shared its meager all to support its first church.

Their eyes are bright with unshed tears as they recall joyous occasions when perhaps there was a wedding or a financial victory to be celebrated; or when all gathered in the church to pay their last respects to some loved member of the community.

Becomes Fisher Hall
The Community church was erected in 1910, under the auspices of the Union Evangelical Christian church. In April, 1918, following its admission to the Los Angeles Presbytery, it became officially the First Presbyterian church of Lomita, although the name "Community" still clings.

When the new church edifice was erected several years ago, the old building was moved to the back of the lot and rechristened "Fisher hall" in honor of Dr. C. N. Fisher, one of the early pastors. Loss of the building is estimated at \$1000, which is only partly covered by insurance, according to L. J. Hunter, one of the trustees. It is the opinion of many of the members that the building will not be replaced for some time.
