Gardena City Council Gets Added Troubles

The new city council of Gardena is faced with a perplexing problem as a result of the recent annexation of Western City to the baby municipality of Southern California. Western City joined Gardena by a vote of 4 to 1 and brought its troubles over to the proposed patent paving of Western avenue, between Rosecrans and Virginia streets, along with it.

After years of delay on a majority petition for the paving of the artery with patent paving, the county board of supervisors are now determined to go ahead with the improvement and have requested the Gardena city council to give its consent to the work.

But the people on Western avenue and in Western City don't want patent paving now, they told the Gardena council. Wayne A. Pogart, mayor of Gardena, has suggested that the interested property owners get up another majority petition asking their new city fathers to withhold consent. Meanwhile the county is urging speed on approving the work. It is believed that a petition from the owners will be presented to the council next week asking Gardena to spurn the county's request.
